### **Brian Belfield**

The death of Brian Belfield whilst competing in the Buttermere Sailbeck Race is a tragedy for his wife Sandra, his family and friends. Every fell runner should sympathise with their loss.

Brian was a member of Staffordshire Moorlands AC and his club has written about him in this issue. Brian had been a member of the FRA for ten years. He was an experienced fell runner, he had completed the Sailbeck race four times since 2006 and in 2010 he completed the Duddon Valley, Ennerdale, Three Shires and Langdale races and so qualified in the Lakeland Classics Trophy. Many of us will have run alongside him.

Her Majesty's Coroner for North and West Cumbria will hold an inquest which will determine the cause of Brian's death.

It is timely to reflect on the number of deaths associated with competitive fell running. In England the total, since the FRA was formed over 40 years ago and for a sport with over 6000 members competing in around 500 fell races a year, is just three. It is almost twenty years since the death of Judith Taylor at Kentmere (1994).

Every Race Organiser and every FRA member is aware of the robust rules and safety procedures set out in the FRA Calendar and Handbook. These have been reviewed and revised regularly to ensure that the sport, given its nature, can be as safe as possible. These reviews will continue. Sanctions will continue to be applied to those who fail to comply.

For the June 1993 Fellrunner the late Mike Rosecompetitor, organiser and a wise and eminent Secretary of the FRA Committee- wrote an article which addressed safety issues arising from the death of Carol Matthews in the Welsh Water Relay race in 1991, and the consequences for the race organiser. His article included the phrase "There but for the grace of God" and it reminded members of the debt they owe to race organisers.

The Sailbeck Race is organised by Mike and Hazel Robinson. They are well known throughout the fell running community and they now face what everyone who has ever been associated with race organisation prays they will never have to endure.

Of course our first thoughts should be for those who grieve for Brian Belfield but our sport only exists because fell runners like Mike and Hazel volunteer to organise races for the enjoyment of other fell runners...

They deserve all the support we can give. Graham Breeze (FRA Chairman)

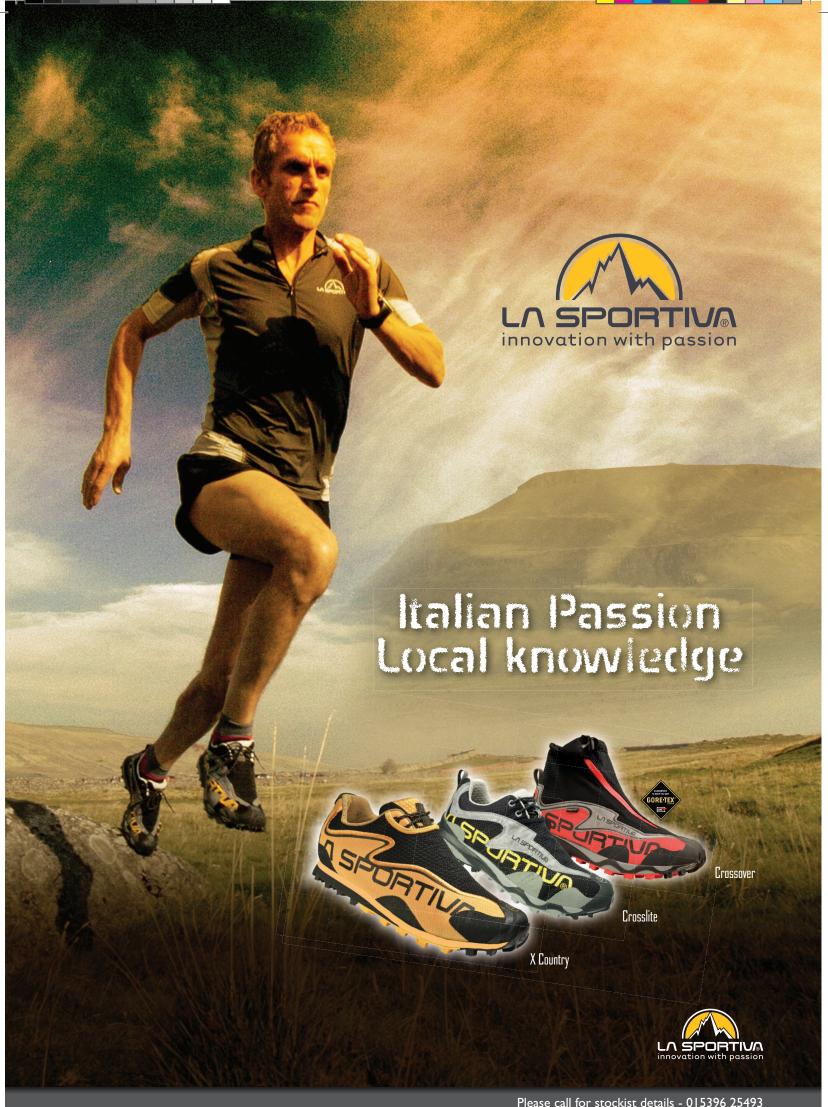

# Secretary's Corner

I took over the role of General Secretary from Alan Brentnall at the 2011 AGM. I am still in many ways feeling my way into the role, so am grateful for Alan's continued presence on the committee as a Member Rep; his vast expertise is still available to the sport. Other experienced members of the committee also help me a great deal. Like all committees, it is a team effort.

Like a number of people on the committee I perform my role whilst holding down a job, and doing a bit of running! So please excuse me if I'm not always immediately available when you call or email me; I'll get back to you as soon as I am able.

There have been two meetings since Alan's last Secretary's Corner. Here are some notes from them - further information can be obtained by contacting me directly.

### Committee Meeting - STAVELEY, SATURDAY 3 DECEMBER, 2011.

Matters relating to the bank mandate for the soon to be active FRA Limited were discussed and new arrangements put in place. I replaced Alan Brentnall on the mandate.

This being the first meeting after the 2011 AGM the composition of the various subcommittees was approved, save for the Junior Sub-Committee where the new Junior Coordinator would assemble his team and report back to the following meeting.

The date for the 2012 AGM was set at 17 November 2012 to tie in with the 2012 Presentation Evening. It was noted that from 2013 onwards, in order to comply with Companies House accounts filing dates, the AGM would move to September.

I provided an update on the incorporation process. The final form of the agreement to transfer the assets, liabilities and activities of old FRA to FRA Limited was approved and the Chairman was authorised to sign the agreement on behalf of old FRA.

Jonathan Broxap reported on Championship matters. Arrangements were well in hand for the 2012 Championship races series. MRAG was considering the position in relation to having an M70 category in the British Championship and whether to add LV40 and MV50 categories in the UKA Fell and Hill Relay Championship. Discussions were continuing with Mercia Fell Runners who were to organise the 2012 Relay Championship. MRAG had also confirmed that medals for the British Championships would from 2012 be awarded to all counting team members identified by the Statistician, bringing the British into line with the English.

The Commonwealth Championships held in Llanberis in September had been a success with 150 athletes from 15 countries participating. Discussions were ongoing about including mountain running and ultra events in the Commonwealth Games. These were unlikely to bear fruit before the 2014 Games but could do so before the 2018 Games to be held on the Gold Coast in Australia.

There was a discussion about the English Schools Fell Running Championships. The English Schools Athletics Association had considered taking these under their wing but had now declined to do so. The FRA was happy to continue to support these Championships, including financially, while the Junior Co-ordinator and his team were happy to organise them.

The McCain Mountain Running Challenge series would run again during 2012. The counting events would be the 2 trial races, the Inter-Counties and the Home Internationals. 2012 would be the last year of McCain's sponsorship.

Two disciplinary matters were mentioned. The first related to a female junior athlete competing in a race longer than that permitted by FRA rules. Discussions had taken place with both the father of the athlete and the race organiser to discuss ensuring the breach was not repeated. The second matter related to the runner who had been disqualified from the Langdale Horseshoe for failing to carry any of the compulsory equipment. The committee endorsed the action taken by the Disciplinary Committee. As a result of the Langdale incident, I agreed to draft a Safety/Rules/Equipment note for the website to draw together a number of key aspects of compliance for competitors for review at the next meeting.

The actions of the Forestry Commission in seeking charges in relation to races in Wales were discussed. As well as an administration fee, fees per runner were also being sought. Developments would be monitored.

The Chairman confirmed that he had written to Bill Johnson of Calder Valley thanking Bill and his team for their efforts in organising the 2011 "Do". Pennine Fell Runners had offered to organise the 2012 "Do", which would take place on 17 November 2012, and this offer was accepted. Clayton had offered to organise the 2013 "Do" and this offer was also accepted.

There was some discussion about likely committee vacancies following the 2012 AGM. Both Margaret Chippendale and Madeleine Watson indicated that they would not be seeking re-election for their posts as Fixtures Secretary and Treasurer respectively. Some planning would be required to ensure new candidates for these two key posts.

### Committee meeting

ILKLEY, SUNDAY 26 FEBRUARY 2012 I reported on various post-incorporation matters. The operations and affairs of old FRA had been transferred to FRA Limited at midnight on 31 December 2011. All members of the committee elected at the 2011 AGM had been automatically appointed as members of the Executive Committee of FRA Limited and had been registered at Companies House as directors of the new company.

The Treasurer circulated a report and a draft, unverified profit and loss account and balance sheet for old FRA for the period from 1 July to 31 December 2011. Neil Hindle the current auditor had been re-appointed at the AGM on the understanding that if the incorporation process came to fruition he would resign. The Treasurer proposed that Mike Welford be appointed as the independent verifier of the accounts for FRA Limited. It was noted that the first accounts of FRA Limited would cover the period 1 January to 31 December 2012 and would see the light of day in early 2013. These accounts would have to be approved by members and filed with the Registrar of Companies before the end of September 2013.

A written presentation from Mercia Fell Runners regarding progress on the organisation of the 2012 Relay Championships was reviewed. Alan Barlow was asked to serve as external referee for the event and would liaise with Bob Dredge at Mercia on matters of detail.

As far as Championships were concerned, it was noted that Pete Bland Sports and Walsh have again agreed to sponsor the Junior Championships for 2012. PBS and Ron Hill have agreed to sponsor the English Schools Championships for 2012. The 2013 UKA Relay Championships will be organised by Eryri Harriers based in Llanberis. Dallam AC has volunteered to organise the 2014 event.

The World Long Distance Challenge will be held in Switzerland in 2012 on 1 August. The trial race will be held on 15 July. Pippa Maddams has been pre-selected as the current title holder.

MRAG has not approved the addition of MV50 category to the Relay Championship feeling this would act to reduce competition in the Open category because guaranteed entries would have to be made available for that new category.

A change was due to take effect to the team eligibility rule after moving clubs. Athletes would now be able to move clubs once in any 12 month period with a restriction on team counting that would practically be limited to 1 month. A second or any subsequent move would trigger the usual 4 month ban for team counting.

The sad death of a young, female cross country runner at a regional Championship race in North London from cardiac problems was noted with regret. The resulting Coroner's inquest had resulted in a formal Rule 43 report to UKA requiring various changes to various aspects of the organisation of cross country

races. Developments would be monitored in case any changes resulting from this event might have an impact on fell running.

Notes from both the Coaching and Junior Co-ordinator reporting on recent developments were received with thanks. The proposals for an FRA Junior Fund were approved in principle and the Junior Co-ordinator would refine the concept and report further at the next meeting.

As a result of the succession of issues arising from the junior age/distance rules, the committee had asked for an initial review of the current arrangements. A summary had been produced by the Welfare Officer assisted by others. A lengthy debate on this complex matter took place. The committee approved a change to the principle of "age on the day of race" for all Junior non-Championship races, hoping that this might help to alleviate some of the complexity inherent in the system. It was noted that this

change required the approval of MRAG before it could be recommended to UKA as a formal rule change so it could not be effective immediately.

On the disciplinary front, a further junior age/distance issue arising at the end of 2011 was discussed.

Access issues were increasing. Pressure and charging from both the National Trust and the Forestry Commission had led both the British Orienteering Federation and one of the national mountain biking bodies to enter into national agreements with those bodies concerning charging. Chris Knox would endeavour to verify and if so, find out more detail. The Noonstone Fell race had been cancelled for the foreseeable future as a result of discussions between the race organiser and Natural England.

My draft notes on safety and related issues were reviewed and approved for publication via both the website and *The Fellrunner*.

- 1. Agenda: a full agenda for the meeting will be made available in due course and will follow the framework set out in article 16 of the articles. The notice containing the agenda will be given on the FRA website as provided for in article 61.
- 2. Resolutions: resolutions to be put to the meeting must be notified to the General Secretary by no later than Friday 24 August 2012 to allow these to be considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting on 2 September 2012.
- 3. Accounts: Owing to the fact that the company is in its first year of operation as successor to the unincorporated body, there will be no accounts to be laid before the meeting for approval. The first accounts of the new company will cover the period 1 January 2012 to 31 December 2012 and will be produced for approval at the Annual General Meeting in 2013. These accounts have to be filed with the Registrar of Companies by 30 September 2013 so the 2013 AGM will take place in early September to accommodate this legal deadline. The final accounts of the unincorporated body for the period 1 August 2011 to 31 December 2011 will be available for members at the meeting but will not be formally reviewed

### 4. Election of the Executive Committee:

a) The officers of the Executive Committee described in article 22 (a) will be elected in the usual way, and nominations for any of these positions must be notified in writing to the General Secretary by Friday 12 October 2012.

- b) Nominations for Representatives of English Clubs (four seats) (article 22 (b)) must be notified to the General Secretary and also to the Chairman by Friday 9 November 2012.
- c) Nominations for Membership Representatives (four seats) (article 22 (c)) may be made at the meeting.
   All members of the Executive Committee must be members of Clubs affiliated for fell running to UK Athletics.

### 5. Voting:

- a) Voting arrangements for members are detailed in article 20.
- b) English Clubs which are affiliated for fell running to UK Athletics and are represented at the meeting are entitled to two votes each. Club appointees for this purpose must be notified in writing to the General Secretary and to the Chairman by Friday 9 November 2012
- c) Each member will have the right to appoint a proxy in accordance with article 15. A proxy form will be available to download with the notice of the meeting.
- **6. Open Discussion**: in accordance with article 16, an open discussion will follow the formal business. This is an ideal opportunity for the members to express views on any aspect of our sport.



# Calendar update

The number of races included in the Calendar continues to increase. Currently there are details for over 580 events. As in the past few years some new events which have been submitted for inclusion have been rejected on the grounds that they do not include genuine fell terrain and would be better described as multi-terrain or trail races. In such cases Permits and associated insurance are more appropriately obtained from other parts of the UKA "family".

2013 race registration information will be sent to organisers, whose race details were included in the 2012 Calendar, at the end of September. I am using email as my primary method of communication with most organisers. If your email address changes

### during the year please let me know or you won't receive a 2013 registration form!

Provision has been made in the FRA race database for two sets of contact details to be entered, one to be used by me to communicate with the race organiser and the other to be displayed in the hard copy and website Calendars. The primary reason for this is to allow the details for someone other than the race organiser eg the Entries Secretary to be included in the Calendar. However it also allows a race organiser, if he so wishes, to give me his email address whilst choosing not to have it included in the Calendar. Anyone else who wants their fell race to be included in the Calendar or who is planning to organise a new

race in 2013 should contact me so I can include them in the mailing.

As the Calendar is now metric race distances and climbs should be supplied in kilometres and metres respectively. At present both imperial and metric measurements are still displayed for races on the website Calendar.

An up to date Calendar is maintained on the FRA website, <a href="www.fellrunner.org.uk">www.fellrunner.org.uk</a>. It also contains links to the Northern Ireland Mountain Running Association, Scottish Athletics, Scottish Hill Runners, Scottish Hill Racing, Welsh Athletics and the Welsh FRA websites where information can be found about those Celtic races which are not included in the FRA Calendar.

# Access and Environment

### **SUMMER 2012**

My article for last summer in 'The Fellrunner' reflected on the drought conditions being endured, in parts of the country, whilst massive volumes of rain were ravaging other areas. Twelve months on and we again have had drought conditions, hosepipe bans, dry streams and worries over crop failures, mostly in the south and east, whilst the north and west of Britain has had more than enough to keep the reservoirs and river systems full. While hosepipe bans were still in place, sudden spring storms caused localised flooding in those areas, river systems unable to cope with the volume of water, yet the reservoirs failed to fill.

But unlike last year with a hot dry April and vast areas of uncontrolled mountain, moorland and forest fires, most of us had a return to winter conditions on the fells. Even into May as I travelled through recovering parts of Scotland that were badly burnt by those fires, I was only two hours behind the snow plough that had just re-opened the Bealach na Ba to Applecross! That brought back memories of one of the LAMM (Lowe Alpine Mountain Marathon) events (Glencarron 2004) in mid-June where, during day one, we were in the thick of a blizzard for a couple of hours - it certainly concentrated the

mind on navigation and tested our kit.

Another thread on our forum is asking about our preferences between fell racing and fell running and it is interesting and pleasing to see that we still have wide ranging views. It seems to be generally though a question of balance, someone I used to train with would have to stop his watch when we stood still to (catch my breath) admire a view/check route etc., and couldn't move off the spot without running and starting his watch at the same time. So of course I used to hesitate, or walk on a little, just to frustrate him, and see how far I could go without him having to start/stop. Sorry Rod, you were too fast anyway!

Running (ok yes a lot of walking) through unfamiliar areas is often a good way to take more notice of the environment that surrounds us, I couldn't help but stop and admire this scene, just a couple of hundred yards (or possibly metres!) from our camp site. The Bluebells were just going over, but the Primroses were in their prime, Lichen, mosses and emerging ferns completing the ground cover over the rocks. Now I could tell you where this is and no doubt some of you will have a pretty good idea of its location, in fact I chatted to one or two FRA members minutes

before this was taken. But isn't the best thing about 'discovering' good routes and wonderful scenes finding it yourself? The other brilliant thing about this location.....absolutely no mobile reception......bliss! Was hoping to find some of our rarer mountain flowers on the high hills, but there was too much snow.

On the racing side, traditional routes for established events seem to be coming under more pressure from other quarters to be modified, moved or removed altogether. For example, The Shining Tor, this years intercounties race, is so lucky to have Alistair Fitzgerald in charge, he has had the patience of a saint in dealing with officialdom. Having jumped through every hoop, dotted and crossed everything else, it was still only a matter of days before the event that the final rubber stamp of approval came through. I gather that Calder Valley are having some issues on local routes, Bill Johnson seems to be handling this on a local basis, so if you plan to run over the Calder moors, it may help to check with the Calder club on sensitive issues.

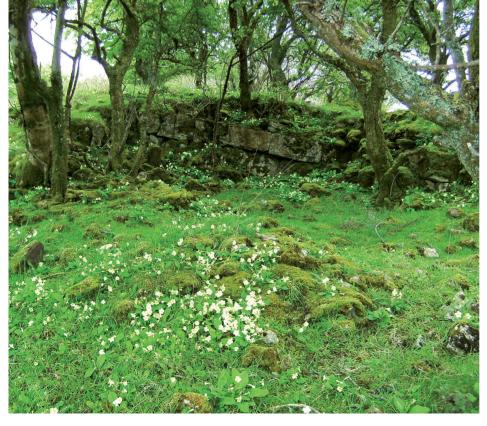
Other areas of moorland, mostly water catchment areas, are in the process of trying to re-establish plant communities to stabilise the loss of peat from erosion. If you come across local diversions to protect seeded areas please respect them – it makes life easier for continued access for our races.

Forestry Commission car park charges seem to be quite a hot potato at the moment, ranging from around £6 up to £10 per car, more for MPV's and other big vehicles, but in one reply to a complaint the FC said "Yes the charges may appear high, but access on foot, bike or horse is free, the charges help pay for the facilities". I have queried this in relation to certain forest areas already charging or threatening to charge access for us to run. I hope we can avoid the blanket charges imposed on commercial events that have a much higher entry fee than our traditional low key fell races.

This year National Parks throughout the UK are celebrating our beautiful winning landscapes that have inspired mountaineers, sailors, cyclists, runners and Olympic athletes to aim higher and train harder - sometimes to record-breaking effect. The celebration week is the first week of August, so if you are racing/training in the parks but part of the family aren't, there may be special events on that they would like to take part in. Prior to that the Olympic torch, having 'done' Scotland for the first time will leave York on the 21st June, through the Dales and into Cumbria, via Appleby to Carlisle. Then through the Lake District on the 22nd, but I have no idea if we have any fell runners involved!

Finally a couple of pleas, as we get into the summer and longer warmer races, gels, food and drinks containers appear like a rash. You can carry them in full, so please carry the empty used bits out. Check and double check for ticks, they certainly appear to be on the increase, if you remove an adult one without killing it and its had a feed from you or your pet, it is capable of producing between 200 and 300 offspring to complete its life cycle.

Have a tick free rubbish free summer.

# BRIANBELFIELD

It is with sadness that we report the death of Brian Belfield who died during the Buttermere Sailbeck Race on April 29th 2012.

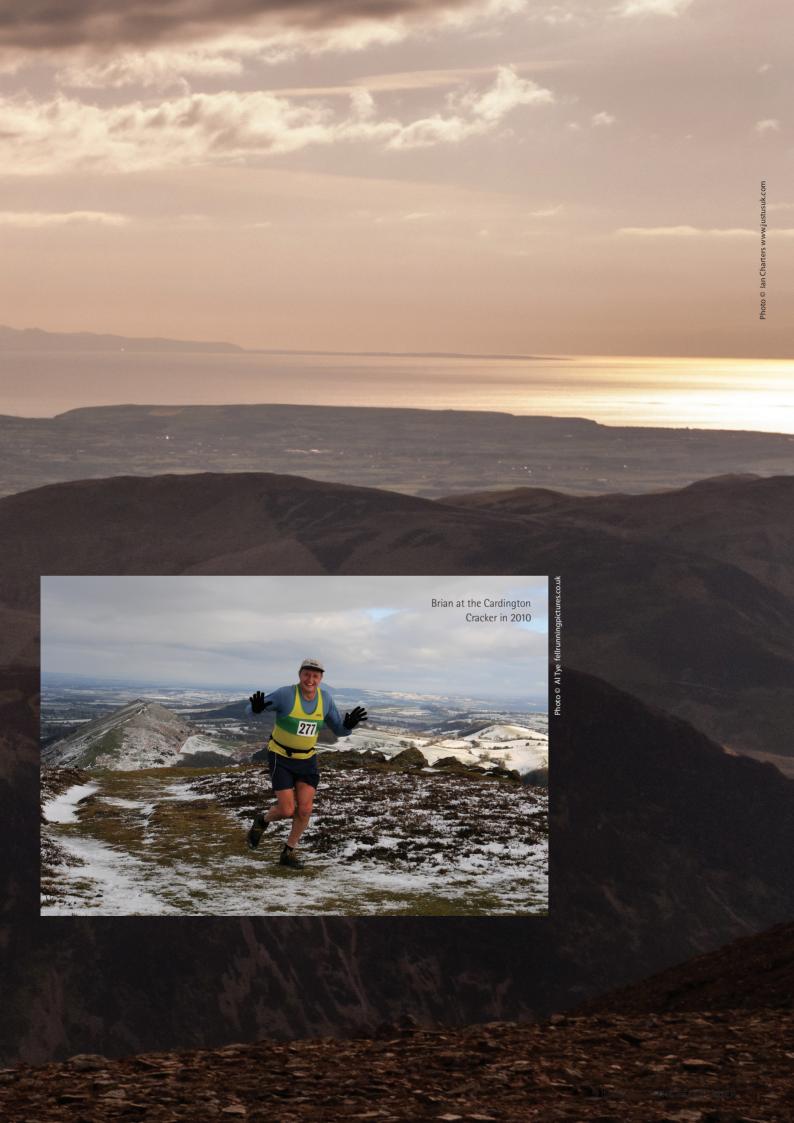
Brian's first sport was football although he had done cross-country at school. At the age of 16 he went for trials with Aston Villa and was well known in Leek throughout the 70s, 80s and 90s as a keen player and manager. A fellow football club member introduced him to running, taking him out on the hills 12 or more years ago. After a 2 hour run up Shining Tor in the Peak District he returned absolutely exhausted but he had got the bug! He wasn't keen on road running which he felt caused him injuries. Instead he kept to the fells, starting off with local races and then getting hooked on the Lake District classics.

In recent years he had entered the Lakeland Classics Trophy managing to complete most of them whilst making a weekend of it with his wife Sandra. When not racing he organised informal long runs over the Moorlands and the Peak District on Sunday mornings. They were not complete without a couple of pints afterwards in a Moorlands pub.

But more than his sporting prowess, Brian will be remembered for his friendly, sunny nature. He was never heard to moan nor to pass unkind comments about others. He had a smile and a story and a good word for everyone he met. He loved corny jokes and according to one club member had a laugh like Muttley! He loved the camaraderie of fell races and his finishing position did not matter to him. He was happy just being in the hills amongst his fellow fellrunners being a great example of the old adage – it's not the winning that counts, it is the taking part. A teammate writes... "one distinct memory that I had of Brian was on the startline of a particularly treacherous snowy and icy running of the tough Cardington Cracker race in 2010, he was

laughing and joking, whilst I and many others were shivering with cold and trepidation. It summed up his great attitude to racing and life, plus showed the rest of us how it should be."

Brian was very much a family man, spending a lot of time with both his son Andrew (who was also lured into running) and daughter Tracy and their families. He had recently introduced his grandchildren to fell walking and last year completed the National 3 Peaks Challenge with his grandson Adrian. At his funeral in Leek hundreds of his old clubmates, customers (he was a painter and decorator), friends and family turned out to pay their respects. A collection was held for the Lake District Search and Mountain Rescue Association whose teams carried on searching for Brian for hours despite adverse conditions. He will be greatly missed by his family, his club and all those who had the pleasure of running with him.

### Fellrunning in bad weather

Dear editor,

Running and racing on the fells is both enjoyable and demanding. Enjoyable when the sun is out and demanding when the cloud is low. It goes without saying that all of us venturing out to the hills need to acquire and develop certain skills, the most important of those being to be able to find our way whatever the conditions.

On a number of occasions in bad weather, race routes are modified either out of concern for the safety of the race marshals or out of concern by the race organisers that a number of race participants may not be able to find their way to the finish safely. A recent example is the Welsh 1000 metre race: There was low cloud, rain, moderate wind and although the air temperature was not low there was a significant chill factor. The long race route was severely truncated, missing out three out of five summits and although the overall distance remained about the same, a good part of it was low level, along tracks and lanes. Overreaction? Yes to some degree. It would have been hard for the marshals on the Carneddau but the marshals on Snowdon seemed to be coping well. The organiser himself did say that in days past the race route would not have been modified but the creeping tendency for litigation was the deciding factor.

Mixed weather, in my humble opinion, enhances the quality of a fell race. It reduces the factor speed and increases the factor mountain craft. If absolute speed is one's main goal then track or road running is the ideal venue. Recent postings in the FRA forums and club blogs regarding the Duddon valley fell race, give a rather disappointing picture of overall fellrunning



ability by many who participated in the race. There are stories of people following one another like headless chickens and although admitting to having map and compass with them, they ended up doing all sorts of detours.

It is a fact that kit checks often show lack of awareness of the need for safety by a number of participants, who are prepared to set off with inadequate safety gear. Although it is possible to remedy this, it is unfortunately difficult to ensure that all who embark on a long race in poor conditions are competent navigators.

This was again a cracking short race for the British championships. The organiser lan Taylor and his team paid impeccable attention to detail. Indeed such was the size of his team of helpers, recruiting most of the local running population, that they exceeded the number of runners in the women's race. On arrival we were handed an envelope containing all that we required, including a numbered clothing bag for transporting gear from the start to the finish and these were laid out in an orderly fashion at the finish. Along with a compulsory kit list, we were provided with crisps, Mars bar and a gel, the latter being useful for those who had not brought the compulsory emergency food. Newcomers had been warned of the 3 climbs to over 700m. Such is the high standard of race organisation at events these days, that all race organisers are to be congratulated for their continuing efforts in meeting these standards.

The item 'All our Yesterdays' in the last magazine rekindled old and fond memories of the 'Hobble'. To help complete George Dimitrijevic's record of the event, I was half of the winning women's team in the first event of 1980, my partner being Maureen Barlow, also of my club Clayton le Moors Harriers. Although I have no official results, my diary entry for that day reads "Finished 13th overall in 7hrs 54m, first ladies. Deep snow in places but brilliant sunshine, hard work over Black Hameldon but generally enjoyed the

I'd done several long distance events by then but Maureen had never walked, let alone run more than 9 miles, so this was unknown territory for her. Nevertheless, her dogged determination and emerging endurance ability got us through, and although she later went on to do several fell races, she was always more at home on the road, clocking a couple of sub three hour marathons in the early 1980s. So relaxed were Maureen and I about the whole thing that day, that we nipped in the pub in Heptonstall and downed a pint of shandy each to help us on our way. That Saturday evening was Clayton's presentation dinner and disco, and I recall old Stan Bradshaw's comment that we still had the energy to dance after the event.

I would tentatively take issue with George that the first event had the option of an elite course, I don't think this came until at least one or two years later, and talking to the 1980 winners, Anne Marie and Will Grindley they also think that this was the case. The set 33 mile course that first year had a slight orienteering challenge in that, along the route there would be checkpoints that weren't revealed until the day, and I well remember the leading teams charging off to the first checkpoint 'ruin' plus grid ref, and assuming that it was Top Withens, the famous Bronte landmark three miles along the route. The canny Grindleys, just behind these leading teams held back, bagging the correct ruin just over Bronte Bridge! This gave them an unassailable lead, and the ultimate victory, despite being the only team required to climb to the top of Stoodley Pike! Subsequently, the marshal there thought that this may prove a bit of an unnecessary, dangerous and quirky addition to the route, and there and then he took the decision to have the checkpoint at the bottom of the Pike.

Yes, the broken biscuits, fruit cake - food for the Gods as you plodded up 'Stairs', mud on Black Hameldon, cobbles at Heptonstall, what memories! It's good to see that the 'Hobble' endures, albeit on a slightly changed route and under a different name, and allowing solo competitors, but I wonder if the Hobble mugs are still given as awards for winners. I have two of these on my shelf, constant reminders of happy days. Thanks George for all your hard work.

### Yianni's Corbett Round

Dear Britta

I read with interest this account in last summer's edition of the Fellrunner, mainly because I had recently visited the Glen Lyon Corbetts in terrible conditions last May, though visiting them singly or in pairs and from the easier approach in Glen Lyon.

This May I was briefly in Tyndrum visiting a few more Corbetts, one objective being to tackle the 5 NE of Tyndrum but hoping to visit a few more, depending on conditions.

My first morning was VERY wet, with a terrible forecast of gales, snow, thunder and lightning, with little prospect of improvement during my 3 night stay. After watching the rain come down for a few hours, I decided I had to at least attempt something, so at 10am set off to tackle Beinn Chuirn, west of Tyndrum and one of the additional ones that Yianni suggested could be added to his dozen. I set off, heading west by the River Cononish from Lower Tyndrum station, in full waterproof gear though the rain was lighter than a few hours earlier. Although only walking I reached the summit in 90 minutes to find a little snow covering, a very cold wind but intermittent views. I decided to descend to the north, to the A85, giving me the opportunity to visit the 2 Corbetts to the east of Glen Orchy, the other additional ones suggested by Yianni. Although still raining, after crossing the A85 I went north through the forest, eventually reaching the SW ridge of Beinn Udlaidh. Although I transiently considered dropping into Glen Orchy to visit Beinn Mhic-Mhonaidh to the west, that thought was soon dismissed because of the big descent. After Beinn Udlaidh I continued east to Beinn Bhreac-liath, where the streams on its western side were being blown vertically by the strong NW wind. I descended NE from this third summit, cutting through the forest to the A82 above Auch. Then came decision time. The rain had stopped and the sun (albeit briefly) was shining, but it was 3pm and tempting to drop down to Tyndrum on the WHW. Ben Odhar and Ben Chaisteil were beckoning from the other side of the valley and I had the prospect of a bad forecast for the next day, so onward and upward.

I had originally planned to tackle 'the five' in an anti-clockwise direction, but as I wanted to finish at Lower Tyndrum, it made sense to go clockwise. At least I was able to take off my waterproof over trousers but the jacket was off only for the ascent of Ben Chaistel before I was once again hit by the bitter wind. I was able to make good progress up the first of these 5, picking my way directly via grassy rakes, rather than the recommended route round the SE ridge. Up and down Beinn nam Fuaran was easy, but after the col the climb to Cam Chreag was interminable. The initial descent was a bit messy but then a gentle climb to Beinn Chaorach, where again there was an icy wind. The descent was very steep and I was pleased not to be going in the reverse direction. Beinn Odhar was a bit of a challenge as I was beginning to feel a little weary but then I had a delightful descent down the SW ridge to meet the WHW by the bridge and forestry plantation with only 2km back to Lower Tyndrum. I clocked in at just under 10 hours, time not being of concern, the achievement being 8 Corbetts in a day. It was only on returning home that I again read Yianni's article. I would recommend any contenders to think about the 3 westerly Corbetts suggested by Yianni and consider missing Beinnn nan Imirean (and perhaps the most easterly summit/s in Glen Lyon). I visited this from the south the following day but returned cross country to Tyndrum and it is a long way out.

Looking at Yianni's kit list, I too had a 25L pack, with very similar contents, but was wearing Innov8 trail shoes with Sealskin socks. I did not need to take reading glasses (!) but had poles and was 'persuaded' to carry a personal locator beacon. The big difference was food. I had set off with 1 Corbett in mind so only had a bag of jelly babies and 2 'emergency' 30ml gels, carrying no fluid, relying on streams 'above the sheep line'. I returned with the gels as although weary on my final hill, it was not an 'emergency'. I saw no one all day, otherwise I might have been tempted to beg, steal or borrow some food. I had eaten a very big breakfast and was well hydrated before starting. Having Lower Tyndrum as my start/finish point meant a little more climbing than had I started off the A82. These were all new hills to me though I had been in the area to visit Munros and done a couple of LAMMS nearby. I have not measured the distance but it was probably only about a third of Yianni's round. I was never racing against the clock and was treating it as a 'long day out'. I had the advantage of visibility most of the time after the first summit.

### FRA Junior Age Limits

Rationalise not penalise!

I have just been reading the article on the FRA Disciplinary Committee in your spring issue.

As an organiser of a fell race for several years I have always tried conscientiously to make sure we adhere to the rules regarding junior age limits. As well as requiring the parent/guardian's signature, we ask for date of birth on our entry form and state clearly that the age limit applies as of the 1st of January. Despite this every year we have to turn away a few runners for both our junior and senior race because of these rules. Most of the parents find it a rather strange rule, and I have to say I agree. I fail to see the logic that says a man qualifies as MV40 if he is forty on the day of the race, whilst a child might not be able to run a race of, for example, lower age limit 10 even if they are 10 years and 364 days old because they were born on the 2nd of January (and a child who is only just 10 on the 1st of January qualifies immediately for all races that year). Our junior race is for 10-15 year olds yet we have to allow 16 year olds to run who were 15 on 1st January.

These rules are confusing for everyone – the junior runners, their parents and the race organisers. And whilst organisers can cope with the rule relatively easily for postal entries (when they have the time to look carefully at the entry forms), it is much more difficult to do so on the day of the race when there is a long queue of impatient runners.

Why do we have to continue with this silly rule? Surely it is better to rationalise the rules, not penalise race organisers or their parents.

Hi Alan,

Britta Sendhofer, Fellrunner editor, has passed your email to me. We are on the case. This topic was discussed at the last FRA committee meeting, and we agreed to change the rule for junior age limits to "age on the day of the race" as you suggest. This does indeed make more sense for a number of reasons, including the problems you mention.

The present rule was set in 1996 for the purpose of the Junior English Championship series. For this it is important that the age category limit is set before the beginning of the series, and we will retain this.

We are consulting with the other British fell and hill running organisations, and it will require approval of UK Athletics and a change in UKA rules, but we anticipate that we can introduce the change next year.

# The 24th UKA British Hill and Fell Relays

Sunday October 14th 2012 - Church Stretton, Shropshire

The 2012 UKA British Fell and Hill Running Relay Championships will be held at the beautiful area of Church Stretton in the heart of the Shropshire Hills, this picturesque and bustling market town is full of the tradition and attracts many visitors to it's delights ranging from tea rooms to antique markets.

The hills that surround Church Stretton are designated an Area of Oustanding Natural Beauty and the Competition Area based on the Long Mynd offers runners an upland plateau of open fell running country with steep sided valleys colloquially known as "batches" and "hollows".

The Courses will have short sections of road but the majority of the courses will be along tracks, paths and on open fell containing heather, bracken and rock.

The height of the Long Mynd stands at 1,693 ft and the tops are exposed, the weather in October can be poor, and the area is notorious for disorientating even local runners in bad weather, but on a good day the panoramic views are worth a picnic stop, it is easy to spot the highest point in Shropshire "Brown Clee", it's sister, the wonderfully named "Titterstone Clee", the well known "Wrekin", the long ridge of Wenlock Edge and in the distance the Malvern Hills.

But on the day, there will be no picnic stops for the Competitors at the Relays!! Each of the four legs will offer a combination of all the local terrain and, as usual, the Navigation Leg will only be revealed on the day.

### **DETAILS**

The event will start at 10 am in the main event centre GR 452 937. OS Explorer Map 217. Near the Village Church, cars will be signposted through the town and will be parked in a designated field (postcode SY6 6EX) a 15 minutes walk away from the event centre, which will be signposted from the car park. No cars will be allowed to park near the event centre. There will be a toilet on the car park and car parking will be £1 per car upon entry.

Limited camping will be available adjacent to the car park, the facilities available are the toilet in the car park and running water. Spaces will be on a first come first served basis, a nominal charge will be made. Changing tent and the majority of the toilets will be at the event centre.

The entry cost for the Relays is £75 per team. This is includes team entry, maps and meal tickets. The meal will be a Hog Roast, with a vegetarian option.

We are lucky to have the co-operation of the local community and there will be separate opportunities to buy teas, coffees, sandwiches and cakes in addition to the above. We would be grateful if you could support these enterprises, on the field and in the town itself.

### **COURSE INFORMATION**

The map will be 1: 25000 scale, with 15m contour intervals, and will be overprinted with the routes. The Map has been specially

produced for us by Wrekin Orienteers, specially adapted for the fellrunner, as such it has clearly defined main and contour features and paths, but has removed the fine details usually associated with orienteering maps.

The routes are covered by OS Explorer Map 217.

**Leg One** – Solo. Estimated winners time approx 35 minutes, partially flagged

**Leg Two** – Pairs. Estimated winners time approx 60 minutes, partially flagged

Leg Three - Pairs. Navigation. Estimated winners time approx 70 minutes

**Leg Four** – Solo. Estimated winners time approx 35 minutes, partially flagged

The website and downloadable information will show courses using public rights of way for the purposes of recceing. These will be made available by the 3rd September. Courses on the day will deviate through private land and will visit checkpoints negotiated for use on race day only. Out of bounds areas will be marked.

If you are recceing please keep to the public footpaths, respect the National Trust and following the Country Code. Thank you.

On the day SPORTident UK Ltd will time and identify competitors.

All competitors are requested to follow the marked sections of their route and visit all their course checkpoints in the right order and where required, register at the checkpoint using the electronic dibber which will, together with the relevant map, be provided in the Team Information Pack.

If it is deemed necessary, a massed start will be affected around mid-afternoon.

### **ENTRY PROCEDURE**

Entries will be online via a link from the website and the entries will open on Monday 18th June 2012 and will close on Monday 10th September 2012. We will aim to allow every Club to enter one Championship 'A' team in each category: Senior; Ladies and Veteran O/40 (age on day of event) so all clubs can be represented in the Championship. Entries will be accepted online, on a first come first served basis, subject to the entry limit of 200.

Club Captains/Secretaries are strongly advised to make a diary note for 18th June to ensure their Club's entry(ies).

Entries will be accepted at the discretion of the Organisers and eligibility may be checked.



### **ENTRY REQUIREMENTS**

- All competing Clubs must be affiliated to UK Athletics
- Each Team will consist of 6 runners

Leg one - Solo

Leg two - Pairs

Leg three - Pairs Navigation

Leg four - Solo

- Runners can only compete in one leg (no doubling up)
- Team members to be first claim for their participating club
- Team members must be over 18 years of age on the day of the event
- Team members must wear their Club Vest
- Legs 2 and 3 will be competed by pairs of runners, these runners must stay in contact at all times during the leg and finish together.
- Team Members will be required to have experience of fell running, and it is strongly recommended that competitors have previously competed in at least two category A races.
- It will be the Club Team Captain's responsibility to ensure that all runners are suitably qualified and experienced to represent their Club in their selected leg.
- FRA Rules for Competition will apply.
- Full FRA kit requirements will be enforced irrespective of weather conditions.
- Please see separate paragraph <u>"ON CARRYING</u> KIT"

### UKA CHAMPIONSHIPS TEAM CATEGORIES

- Open
- Women
- O/40 Veterans (age on day of event)
   In addition there will a separately recognised
   0/50's Veterans (age on day of entry) category.

Championship medals will be provided by the UKA for the first three teams in the Open, Ladies and O/40 Categories.

Mercia Fell Runners will award medals in other categories.

### **ON CARRYING KIT**

It is a race rule (Rule 9 – FRA Safety Requirements for Fell Races) that full kit be carried by each runner:

- Windproof whole body cover
- Other body cover appropriate for the weather conditions
- Map (provided) and compass suitable for navigating the course
- Whistle

It is the responsibility of each Team Captain to ensure that their team members are aware of this rule and comply with it. Failure to comply will lead to team disqualification.

The organisers expect all runners to compete on a fair basis within the rules and having regard for their own safety and that of others. Given the numbers of runners and the relative complexity of a multi-leg relay race, it is considered neither reasonable nor practicable to physically check every item of kit.

So ...



### KIT CHECK

The organisers will take the following steps to promote compliance with the rules and for the safety of competitors:

- Kit checks will be made on a random basis at any time before a competitor starts his/ her race – including in the holding pen as a competitor prepares to commence his/ her run. Runners must therefore enter the holding pen allowing time for a kit check to be carried out. A runner leaving and re-entering the holding pen may be subject to an additional kit check. Anyone who is non-compliant will be withdrawn and not allowed to run.
- On course marshals will record and report to the Race Referee any runner who appears to be carrying no, or inadequate, kit
- Kit checks will be carried out immediately on finishing for all runners in class-leading positions and on a random basis for all other competitors. Anyone found to be noncompliant will render their team disqualified

and will be subject to possible further disciplinary measures on reporting to the Race Referee.

Do not CHEAT, Carry the kit.

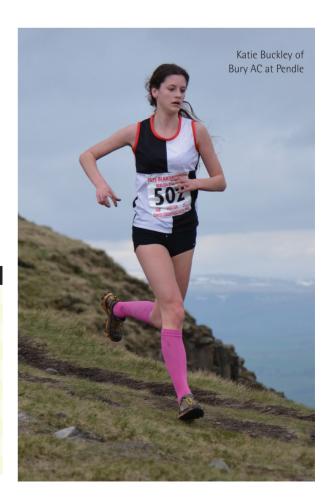

#### Junior Newsletter

In order to improve communication & highlight any junior news or issues, I am putting together an one page newsletter available at each Championship race registration. This will also highlight any questions I get asked around junior matters that may need clarifying. #### FRA Junior Grant

A new grant from the FRA is being made available to clubs specifically for junior development. This could cover personal running kit, equipment for junior races, to cover costs to attend some of the excellent coaching courses Graeme Woodward is running, whatever, if it helps your club in developing its junior section, please get in touch.

Clubs will be required to submit a proposal to the Junior Coordinator demonstrating clearly in what way the grant would enhance the long term development of the clubs junior section and how the grant would be spent.

A maximum of initially up to £200 will be available. Clubs who are successful will not be able to apply the following year. This is a new development but if clubs come forward with good ideas it is possible the level of funding for each club and the overall funds available might

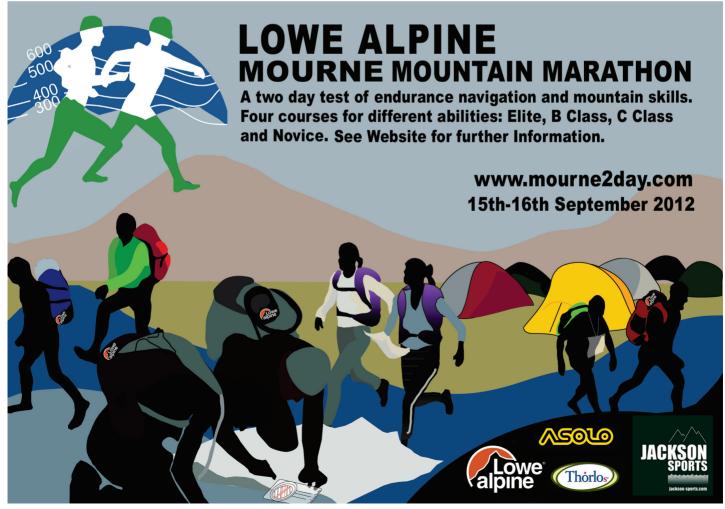

# Uphill and Downhill Running Technique

Fell racing and mountain racing involves much running on the flat. So all runners should try to perfect their flat running technique first as both uphill running and downhill running have much in common with good flat running technique.

Flat running technique requires a tall and upright posture (hips tall), relaxed backward drive of the arms and the foot landing beneath the hips – flat or forefoot. The even surface will help the rhythm to be steady and the pace may be dictated by fitness levels. Foot placement just either side of a sports hall line with toes pointing forwards and arms driving backwards and forwards (not across the chest) is usually a sign of good running mechanics.

**Uphill running** requires exactly the same running style in terms of where the body parts are in relation to each other but the terrain will guide the efficiency and pacing. The stride length shortens and the runner maintains rhythm as the steepness dictates stride length. The steeper the hill the shorter the stride length. This is very similar to the gears on a bike as you ride up a steep hill, lower gears are used (akin to a shorter stride). If you try to run up the hill without altering your stride length, from how it was on the flat, you may run out of steam before the top and start walking. Most runners who find climbing difficult do so because they try to keep the same stride length and so gradually slow down.

**Downhill running**. This is where things can get a bit tricky if the hill has a steep gradient. Otherwise the rules are the same as they are for flat running. However, descending often requires more control with the arms additionally being used more for balance. The foot strike should be 'active' which means landing with a flat foot so that you can control optimum landing while also controlling gravity. Having moved off foot contact the heel comes up and underneath the



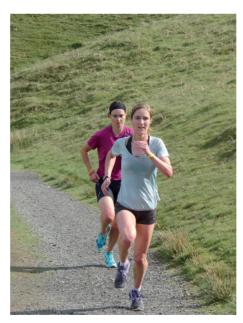
Tall descending technique with a slight lean forwards.

buttock to clear the ground. Running downhill normally requires the heel to be picked up more quickly and higher than it does when running on the flat. The body position should be with a slight lean forward, to limit the likelihood of leaning back and braking too much. If you feel out of control or that the terrain is dangerous, leaning back and landing heel first is usually the quickest option to slow yourself down.

So let's break down the uphill and downhill technique in more detail. We normally break the running action down into four phases: Drive, Flight, Support (or landing), rear leg recovery.

#### **Uphill**

**Drive** - the objective is to maximise appropriate vertical height gain without losing speed. You need to do this by adjusting your cadence and stride to the slope. The rear leg drives the body forward and up by extending at the hip, knee and ankle. Hips face forward. Body is in a near straight line from head to toe with a slight forward lean. The opposite arm drives forward but does not dominate the action.



Flight - the objective is to minimise the time in the air but maximise stride distance. The stride is short to conserve energy. The knee will have been driven high and the foot should be dorsiflexed (toes pointing up towards the shin) like a sprinter so that the foot is ready to land in an 'active' position.



Support (or landing) - the objective is to land actively and gain a smooth transition into the next stride. The lead leg gives by stretchshortening at the hip, knee and ankle but does not collapse on landing. The body remains strong in the core and does not collapse forwards or over rotate at the waist.



**Rear leg recovery** - the objective is to move the rear leg into a position to become active in the next stride and to maximise flight. The drive leg is pulled off the ground with the knee leading the recovery under the body and upwards in



front of the body. The foot should move into dorsiflexion under the body. The opposite arm should drive backwards, elbow first, to just past the mid-line of the body.

#### **Downhill**

The key here is to relax and allow gravity to do the work. For this reason the **drive** phase is less pronounced as gravity means that the drive is forward rather than up and your cadence is dictated by how quickly gravity is moving you forwards. You should lean slightly forwards. The arms may be held out to the side for balance, depending on terrain and core stability.

The **flight** phase will be dictated by the gradient of the hill and gravity. Some may be able to 'bound' down the hill and have a longer time in the air. This usually results in DOMS (Delayed Onset of Muscle Soreness) the following day as a result of absorbing massive impact as bodyweight landing often exceeds 6 times the body weight with most impact going through the thighs. This is not usually recommended as injury can also follow when the DOMS is slow to repair.

A better option is to adopt a medium stride length along the lines of lan Homes who is renowned as one of the best descenders still competing. Ian exemplifies all that is efficient in descending, free flowing and strong at the core with minimal movements above the hips when descending. Landing flat footed and with an unrushed free flowing style he is the envy of

many as he floats away.

Suppoert Landing should still be with an active, flat foot and the foot should be underneath the hips unless you feel you are going to lose control or are scared of the gradient and then you may land with your heel first as this will give you a breaking action and slow you down. If you are opting for a heel first landing keep the flight phase to a minimum and take smaller strides to avoid hurting your heels with abrupt braking. You should stay strong in your core when landing. The hip, knee and ankle will give slightly but should not collapse.



The rear leg recovery should come up high underneath the buttocks to avoid making contact with obstacles like grass tufts or rocks and to optimise flight.

To practise all of the above it is advisable to find yourself a training partner, leader or coach who can observe your technique up and down and give you feedback. Video images are readily available via a mobile phone. Sometimes the way we feel we are running isn't the way someone else sees it. For example, you may feel that you have shortened your stride as you begin a climb but seeing yourself may help improve you technique. Remember that practice doesn't make perfect - only perfect practice makes perfect so another pair of eyes could put you on the straight and narrow or on the ups and downs in this case!

# Hypothermia & fell running

All fell runners should be aware of hypothermia. Previous Fellrunner magazines have warned of the dangers but the growth in new FRA members warrants a further article. Because of his extensive Mountain Rescue experience I asked Ian to produce the following.

It is well known that fell runners do not like carrying stuff. We want to feel free in the elements and be as unencumbered with kit as possible.

For most of us keeping cool on a big climb is generally more of a concern than how to keep warm. Red faces and sweaty bodies are nature's way of regulating our temperature in such conditions but as we know they can only go so far and we sometimes need to provide

nature with assistance to cool ourselves down. Our bodies' have converse methods to keep us warm when we actually reach the top of the hill or pause to eat. Again, whilst very efficient, and really quite a feat of engineering, our bodies can only do so much to combat the cold.

And this is where travelling too light can create a problem as we may not have the means to bolster our bodies' inbuilt responses.

Hypothermia is the dominant cause in most fell runner deaths. It is also, if not the prime cause, then a secondary concern in many Mountain Rescue call-outs.

On the hill the condition is generally seen as Exhaustion Hypothermia. This is an insidious condition. It creeps up so slowly that its victims do not notice the symptoms of its gradual onset.

The alternative, Immersion Hypothermia, is brought about by sudden heat loss typically caused by falling in water - or a particularly large bog.

#### As humans we operate most effectively with a body temperature of around 37C.

When heat is allowed to leave our bodies without being replaced the temperature will drop. A very small loss is all it takes for the early stages of Hypothermia to start to take hold. This is something we will all have experienced at one time or other and is characterised by the shivering that we all recognise as our bodies' way of telling us to put on an extra fleece, eat something sugary or drink something warm. However shivering whilst running is not reliable as it is hard to shiver AND run, thus while running and losing heat the runner may lower their core temp significantly and only start shivering when they stop. Feeling cold, poor decision making, poor concentration (e.g. navigation errors), fatigue, and irritable mood are also all early signs. The body's energy needs also increase in mild hypothermia because the sugars are used to create heat, and by the muscular effort of shivering. Heart rate and breathing initially increase to help with the increased demand, but then reduce as shivering stops.

Shivering cannot be absolutely relied upon as an indicator of cold as pain from an injury may prevent it so making sure an injured person is kept warm is important both in terms of preventing shock and hypothermia.

#### Once the body is down to 35C it is now suffering from Mild Hypothermia.

As your temperature drops the body decides that it is fighting a losing battle in trying to raise the temperature of the whole so concentrates

its efforts purely on survival. As the body cools further, shivering will stop. The body is now becoming severely hypothermic. You will stop shivering but not because you are getting warm. Blood will be drawn into the core. Heart rate and breathing will slow down. As blood cools it becomes more viscous, takes more effort to pump round and is less able to carry oxygen. Without sufficient oxygen the body cannot metabolise sugars so energy levels drop further creating a vicious cycle. Being dehydrated will exacerbate the problems.

As the cooling continues the victim may become incoherent and display 'the Umbles': grumbling, mumbling, stumbling, fumbling, apathetic or irrational. Skin will become pale and clammy (remember to check under clothing as well as the exposed bits). It may sound like a parody but lips and



fingers really do turn blue. Blood should usually take 2 seconds to return to the skin on a fleshy extremity after pressure is applied with finger and thumb. If it takes longer than this it is an indication circulation is slowing down.

Below 32C, consciousness is often lost and the heart beat can become irregular. The body no longer has the energy to make the muscles work to generate heat so stops trying and releases the blood it has managed to keep warm into the full circulatory system. It is this that results in the phenomenon of a hypothermic person sometimes taking off all their clothes and complaining of being too hot. At 28C a cardiac arrest is almost a certainty.

#### So, how should we respond to a Hypothermia victim?

Well first, remember you are the most important person there. Helping others is all very commendable but creating a second victim by getting cold yourself will help no one. Prevent further heat loss by putting on dry clothing, find shelter, insulate from the ground and rewarm the body slowly. Don't forget to remove wet clothing; the body cools much quicker when wet. Get off the hill if possible. Do not apply direct heat (eg heat pads, standing in front of a fire, sitting on a radiator).

Warm, sweet drinks, high energy food and gels will help replace lost energy and warm from the inside out if the casualty is able to swallow. Do not give alcohol or caffeine. Treatment and movements should be gentle as rough handling, rapid movements and vigorous rubbing can cause cold blood to rush to heart and brain. This is likely to cause Ventricular Fibrillation (VF arrest) - otherwise known as a cardiac arrest. If the casualty is unconscious check the air way but if you cannot find a pulse do not attempt resuscitation unless you can keep up CPR until you can get to a hospital. There is a Mountain Rescue adage that a Hypothermic victim is not dead until they are warm and dead. Survival rates from Hypothermia can still be quite high even for those found with no apparent signs of life.

Finally, never underestimate the value of encouragement and a good hug; a positive attitude and shared body heat can make a massive difference to recovery.

#### Of course prevention is better than cure.

Basic physics states that energy can be conserved and converted. In fell running terms that is wearing the right clothes and eating the right foods. Make sure you take on enough food before & during a run. Recognising when you need to take in more food and water, when energy levels are dropping and you are in danger of pushing yourself too far is key, not only to improving performance but, preventing Hypothermia. It's worth bearing in mind that if you are recovering from an illness particularly cold or flu you are much more susceptible.

Make sure you understand the gradual effects of cold and make allowances for wind chill. Warm, dry clothing is important in staving off both Immersion and Exhaustion Hypothermia. Pay particular attention to the extremities, especially head, neck and hands. When checking for a pulse, it is particularly important to keep these "Arterial" areas warm. They have a high volume of blood, close to

#### Case Study

#### This incident happened at Tanky's Trog as remembered by those who were there

#### THE RUNNER'S STORY.....

Around Hey Moss before the first CP I took a dunking in a bog. I went in over my waist but as I was running the momentum of moving forward caused my body to flop forward when I was already waist deep. As a result all the front of my chest and neck became wet. I got out and carried on through CP1 over the road and towards Lawrence edge. As we started to climb up we were hit by the hail storm. I started to feel a little cooler but not cold. Once at the top we started running again. I started feeling tired and lethargic. I thought I was starting to bonk a bit so I had some jelly babies and an oat biscuit - during this time we (I was running with my mate Chris; we had agreed beforehand to stick together) slowed down to a run / walk. I was feeling ok apart from having no energy. Chris was talking to me and said I seemed "normal" but I couldn't shake off the lethargy and get moving properly again.

We stopped for a minute and I put on my mountain wind proof over my other tops. I already had on 2 long sleeved tops, club vest with my OMM smock over the top as well as a hat and tights. We then saw a MR guy about 1k from snake pass. We stopped and spoke to him for a minute and he gave me ½ a cup of coffee. After drinking the coffee I felt a lot better, unfortunately it didn't last long. I then told Chris that I was going to retire at the next CP as I didn't feel up to it. Once at Snake Pass I told Chris to leave me and that I would make my own way down the road to CP2. By the time I got to Birchen Clough car park I felt lousy. Being a cheeky bugger I asked a guy in a Saab estate, who was supporting some other runners, if he would give me a lift to Snake Inn which he did. Once there I retired from the race and went inside to keep warm.

In the pub I stripped off my wet tops and put a dry one on, got a coffee and some food from the bar (glad I didn't get a pint or who knows what state I would have been in). I stood next to the fire to warm through - this was a big mistake. Once by the fire I started shivering slightly - this was the first time I had shivered all day. The shivering became a bit more violent. I ordered another coffee.

Shortly afterwards one of the MR medics came in. The bar maid was a little bit concerned about me and asked if they could check me out. I agreed to this. I then heard a voice say do you realise your face and lips are blue? 'No', was the answer. Then someone asked me to stick my tongue out, and I heard someone say your tongue is blue. I am not a doctor but I know that wasn't a good sign. The MR medic and doctor put their hands in to my arm pit and said I was very cold. The next 5 to 10 min's are a bit of a blur but I remember been asked if I minded stripping off my damp socks and leggings and putting some more dry clothes on. Again I agreed and before I knew it I had been stripped and

redressed in dry warm clothes, moved away from the fire, my feet elevated and I was given 2 sweet cups of hot chocolate, had a gel pack squeezed in to my mouth and a temperature probe shoved under my arm pit – my core temp was recorded at 33.4C - not good.

My pulse was checked and was 89bpm which I am told is fairly high. My details were taken and a log filled out.

In amongst all the above a brief discussion was held by the MR about calling the air ambulance out - thankfully it didn't come to that!

The MR team then monitored and chatted to me for the next 45 min's until my core temperature rose to 36.9C

By this time Chris had finished the race and driven around to the Snake Inn. He retrieved my warm dry clothes from the car and I changed in to those before been sent on my way

On reflection hypothermia snuck up on me. Chris and I kept talking to one another and looking out for any symptoms as we run but there were not the obvious ones like shivering, confusion, slurred speech. With hindsight other more subtle symptoms were there like coldness, tiredness and lack of energy but these can also be the product of a day out on a cold hill.....

#### THE MEDIC'S STORY

"The casualty had already been seen by me in the car park and I had offered him a blanket which he refused. Interesting how he can't remember talking to me and the team doctor after being dropped off.

He sat right in front of the fire which caused a rapid re distribution of warm/ cold blood causing classic 'after drop'. His 2 cups of coffee were espresso, the caffeine content of which would help along the hypothermia by stimulating him further. Caffeine, like alcohol, predisposes a person to hypothermia

The lift in the car would have further added to the cooling process as he had stopped exercising. Humans are homoeothermic; we generate heat through exercise.

The lethargy he describes is the early onset symptoms of hypothermia. By the time he hit the pub he was probably heading into the second stages which had been helped by incredibly rapid rewarming in front of that fire, being a fit fell runner probably helped fight off unconsciousness less fit individuals may not have been so fortunate

He was given sweet warm food and drink, glucogel (23g 40% Dextrose), and changed wet for dry clothes and put into a casualty bag(big fleece sleeping bag) at the back of the pub away from the fire.

The doctor will concur that the casualty was borderline severe hypothermia, and if left untreated would most probably have lost consciousness in the pub - it was his fitness that kept him fighting on so long."



the surface of the skin. Think how we instinctively tuck our chins on to our chests and hide in a high collar when it's cold, but "expose" our necks when it's warm. These are examples of the body instinctively doing the right thing.

#### Dress for the conditions;

We have all seen runners on cold days in vest and shorts that must use more energy keeping warm than keeping their legs moving. Minimum kit levels are decreed by FRA race rules but consider whether minimum kit is sufficient for your needs and then use it. In the 2007 Edale Skyline a number of runners were afflicted with hypothermia despite carrying minimum kit. In some cases it was because they were indeed carrying it rather than wearing it and eating it. Marshalls reported having to dress and feed runners because fingers were no longer capable of opening a bum bag or gel pack. Interestingly, this occurred more with faster runners (who presumably thought they were not going to be out long enough to get hypothermic or were generating sufficient heat through their running) than the slower ones.

In respect of other kit, survival bags are better than blankets for retaining heat. Plastic backed foil does not tear as easily as foil on its own whilst retaining a weight benefit over plastic alone. Remember however foil only work with reflected heat; if you are very cold, there is little heat to be reflected back. If you are going out as a group think about sharing the weight to include a group shelter and emergency kit, especially at night.

It can take experience and a brave decision not to push on, especially when in a group. Always work to the ability and condition of the weakest member of the group and perhaps arrange a buddy system to make sure everyone has an eye kept on them. In any combination of WET, WIND AND COLD be more cautious. These are the killers. As a general rule, if conditions are such that you have to ask whether to go on, the answer is probably 'no'.

Our bodies have remarkable ability to generate and conserve heat but in extremes of environment we need to give a helping hand.

## For FAQ's sake

Medical professionals are often guilty of using jargon that leaves us totally confused – including me!! Hopefully the age has gone when we blindly accept medical opinions, and nowadays it is important that we understand as much as possible to help us decide the best way forward. I am often asked for my opinion on various medical issues and whether particular treatments work or are just the latest fashionable gimmicks. I thought it might be useful to share my responses to some of the most commonly asked questions, but I must stress these are my opinions based on my own experiences.



#### What are anti-inflammatories and should I take them?

These are tablets such as ibuprofen, diclofenac, and nurofen and they 'do what it says on the can'. They can also be referred to as non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAID's)

Anti-inflammatories try to minimize the inflammatory reaction by inhibiting the production of prostaglandins which are responsible for the pain and inflammation following an injury. For some time there has been some concern that inflammation is an essential part of the healing process and this shouldn't be inhibited when tissues are trying to repair.

There is a time and place for this medication, particularly in inflammatory disorders, but they

shouldn't be taken like smarties in relation to a sports-related injury. Several years ago I saw an article in a club magazine suggesting that runners shouldn't go to physiotherapists for the treatment of running injuries when antiinflammatory tablets worked just as well, but perhaps the evidence suggests otherwise.

There are now numerous research articles and papers suggesting that NSAID's can delay muscle regeneration after injury (Almekinders, Gilbert), have a retarding effect on fracture healing (Allen, Wase), and have a significant adverse effect on the healing and strength of wounds (Dvivedi, Tiwari). They are also known to be a cause of stomach ulcers, and can cause potentially

fatal internal bleeding. If you need to take them on a regular basis, it is worth discussing it with your GP as it may be necessary to take medication to help protect your stomach – before you develop problems.

Interestingly, a survey carried out in New Zealand found paracetomol (which is a painkiller and not an anti-inflammatory), was actually more effective at reducing pain following soft tissue injury, plus there was less chance of re-injury as the healing process had not been delayed by any anti-inflammatory medication (Jones). Except in particular circumstances, I would tend to recommend paracetomol for soft tissue injury pain rather than anti-inflammatories.

#### What do you think about steroid injections and what should I do after having one?

Steroid injections are sometimes recommended when an injury does not respond to any other form of non-invasive treatment. Years ago I had one for tendonitis in my hand (overuse!!), and because I followed the recommendations carefully, it was extremely effective and hasn't recurred since. Certain structures in the body respond well to these injections, but other structures are totally unresponsive so in these situations the procedure would be totally useless.

I personally don't do these injections given I am based in a private practice and don't have access to on-site emergency medical care should an individual experience an adverse affect, but many hospital-based musculoskeletal physiotherapists now carry out these injections. They may also be carried out by a GP, Orthopaedic Consultant or a Consultant Radiographer who can do them under the guidance of an ultrasound scan to guarantee the exact site for the injection.

From personal experience, I have found the best results tend to be achieved when there is as much rest as possible of the injected area for the first 48 hours, followed by considerably reduced activity until day 12. From 2-6 weeks post-injection, exercise should be gradually increased to enable the injured structure to resume as normal activity

as possible whilst under the effect of the strong anti-inflammatory. Tissues respond to the strains and stresses applied through them, so this time is paramount and must be maximized. If the injury is rested during this time, it doesn't encourage the fibrous tissue to be broken down and the injury will still be present after the effects of the injection have worn off.

Steroid / cortisone injections shouldn't be a 'quick fix' to get you back running quickly. The tales of sports people being injected just prior to events to enable them to compete are true, but afterwards most suffer and most regret their actions.

#### Do physiotherapy machines really do anything?

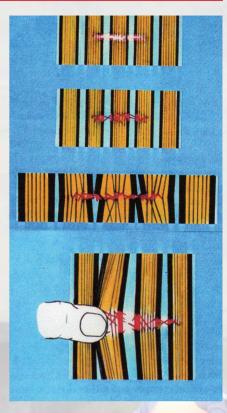
Yes! Physiotherapists use various electrical machines to enhance the body's repair processes and / or help reduce pain. Different machines have different effects on the body, with some being more effective for particular types of injury or at specific stages of recovery. For example, a combination of laser treatment and pulsed electro-magnetic energy can significantly increase the healing rate of a stress fracture, reducing the overall time from approximately 6 weeks to 1 week.



Different types of massage are more effective for different situations.

Sports or remedial massage tends to be applied in the direction of the muscle fibres and helps to 'flush out' the system. This is called effleurage and helps reduce any build up of waste products and is particularly beneficial when training or racing regularly. If fibrous scar tissue is present as a result of injury, this is not the type of massage to resolve the problem.

Cross-frictional massage is carried out at 90 degrees to the direction of the fibres and is comparable to strumming across guitar strings causing separation and movement of individual fibres. Scar tissue often results in cross-fibre formation between the parallel fibres of the damaged structure affecting the mobility and flexibility of the affected area. It is cross frictional massage and deep soft tissue massage that are more specific for the treatment of an injury.



#### What is eccentric loading?

When a muscle contracts concentrically, the muscle shortens as it contracts resulting in movement, eg when the biceps muscle contracts the hand is brought up towards the shoulder. If a muscle contracts or is loaded eccentrically the muscle fibres gradually lengthen whilst remaining under tension. In the same example, the hand would slowly be moved away from the shoulder until the arm became straight again, with the slow release of the biceps

controlling the speed of the movement.

Tendons have been shown to adapt to mechanical forces by changing their make up and structure. It is known that damaged tendons repair by producing type III collagen, but this adapts to type I following eccentric



loading. The Achilles tendon can be loaded eccentrically by standing with the ball of the foot on a step, then gradually lowering the heel down towards the floor. Regimes of eccentric exercises have been developed which have been shown to be particularly effective in the rehabilitation of injured tendons. (Check out Alfredson, Maffulli and Rees).

#### How does acupuncture work?

The traditional chinese medicine belief is that acupuncture needles help to balance out our individual energy channels to promote wellbeing and good health. It isn't just a treatment for when you are injured or unwell, but instead is regarded more as a maintenance treatment – to help keep you well.

In 2002 when I was studying for my MSc I tried to find published studies on the effectiveness of acupuncture for the treatment of acute sports injuries and failed miserably. 10 years later there are teams

of scientists around the world carrying out fascinating research on the body's responses to this treatment. Helene Langevin (www.Helene.Langevin@uvm.edu) has shown that an acupuncture needle inserted into an area of soft tissue damage encourages the injured cells to re-align in a more normal, organized parallel formation, rather than the haphazard formation which is normally seen in scar tissue. These findings weren't known 10 years ago, but with this knowledge, we now know that

acupuncture can play an important role in the treatment of soft tissue injuries.

Specific acupuncture points produce different responses in the body. We know it can significantly help improve the chances of pregnancy in cases of infertility, help boost the immune system in particular disorders, and reduce the pain in many chronic conditions, to name a few. With continued research, we may eventually accept acupuncture more readily as a treatment, and instead start to question the drugs cabinet.

#### What is that brightly coloured tape that everybody's got on?

All areas of sport now seem to be inundated with people wearing a combination of bright pink, blue, black and beige tape. This is Kinesio Tape which can be used to:-

- help inhibit muscle function when muscles have been or are being over-used,
- assist muscle activity in areas of weakness,
- help reduce swelling, bruising and assist in lymphatic drainage.

The tape mimics the elasticity of the skin and the different tapes (despite the colour), all possess the same qualities. The effectiveness of the tape is totally dependent on its application, with the tape being applied in particular directions and under different tensions for the desired results. The tension applied through the tape whilst being positioned is critical, and Kinesio Tape Practitioners are trained to apply the tape

accurately. The various application techniques result in the unique patterns which are often works of art in their own

It is possible to purchase 'pre-cut tape' from certain pharmacists, but at almost £10 per application, it is an expensive experiment if you haven't been shown how to apply the tape accurately for your particular problem. The tape isn't re-usable and cannot be re-applied if applied incorrectly.

I am trained in the application of Kinesio Tape, as are the other physiotherapists who work alongside me. Whilst there isn't much published evidence available yet, our personal experiences are impressive and we have been amazed by some of the results we have achieved.



#### Do I have to wear compression socks whilst running or can I just wear them for recovery?

Compression socks work differently when worn during a run or afterwards during the recovery time. Obviously to wear them for both gives you the best possible outcome, but it is down to the individual.

- Whilst running they reduce the oscillation of the muscles, reducing the micro-damage which can occur as a result of the vibration. Recent evidence has suggested that the stride length is slightly longer in individuals who wear compression socks, which is possibly due to the decreased vibration of the muscles on impact. Several have also reported experiencing less cramp whilst wearing them during running.
- Afterwards they support the circulatory system and help to keep the blood flowing rather than pooling in the legs. Long-term this can reduce the risk of serious vascular disease and varicose veins.



#### A little knowledge is not necessarily dangerous

A runner was sat in my reception area telling my secretary that he was at his wit's end. He had spent a fortune seeing various people, but despite this nobody seemed to know what was wrong with him and he was desperate to get back running. After explaining his symptoms, she suggested what was likely to be wrong and how I would probably treat him. Not being aware of this conversation, I proceeded to assess him, explain what I thought was the problem and how we were going to try and resolve it. I cannot use his exact words, but they were on the lines of - "even your secretary diagnosed that... and she said that's what you would probably do to me".

My secretary isn't medically trained, but with the knowledge she has gained whilst working alongside me, she was able to hazard a guess at the problem and suggest a way forward. Hopefully, with more knowledge, articles like this will help give you more information to help you to make those all important decisions.

# 25 years of the Nine Standards race



#### Background

The Nine Standards are probably more familiar to fell walkers than fell runners. The Standards are cairns built to a height of over eight foot, from flat grit stones quarried on the site. They stand in a line along the Hartley parish boundary on the Pennine Watershed - where Wainwright's Coast to Coast Walk crosses. Here westbound walkers gain a magnificent view down the broad green expanse of the Eden Valley, with their first sight of the Lakeland fells beyond. To the East, there are miles of wilderness, with a single oasis visible five miles away at Tan Hill, the highest pub in England.

The origin of the Standards is unknown for certain, but a common theory is that they were built to resemble an army encampment to ward off marauding Scots, in the days when raids were a constant threat to local inhabitants!

The recently founded Nine Standards Race starts four miles away at the foot of the Pennine escarpment – in the market square at Kirkby Stephen, the main town for the Upper Eden Valley, at a height of 570 feet. The town population is 1500 and straddles the A685 for about a mile. The wide Market Street forms a regular stopping place for motorists travelling between Lancashire and the North East. The town becomes especially lively during October, when the through traffic is boosted by coach loads of Geordies en route for the Blackpool Illuminations. This influx of transient visitors coincides with a very important local event – the annual sheep sales.

The area has some geological significance, due to lying on the Dent fault. The lower slopes of the Pennines are of limestone, as seen in the large quarry passed on the race, while red sandstone becomes increasingly evident going down the Eden Valley.

The race is held on New Years Day, and starts at noon in front of the Cloisters, an architectural oddity at the main entrance to the church yard. The race route leads from the market square, down one of the many passages or "ginnels" to cross Frank's Bridge over the River Eden. A surfaced footpath brings you to Hartley village where you turn right and soon cross the beck by a small footbridge. The fell road is followed for the next one and a half miles, climbing past the quarry to the fell gate, and the track beyond which was formerly used for leading coal from pits on the fell. After a little more than half a mile up this track it passes a stone shooting box and crosses Faraday Gill. The route then follows the gill for a similar distance; first along the coal road, and later on a less distinct track up to a prominent cairn where the Standards reappear

to view. The final leg, again a little more than half a mile long, is across flatter peaty areas with a couple of steep gritstone slopes, then the odd peat hag and up to the Standards at the north end of a gritstone ridge.

There may be the odd one who can't resist the temptation to collect a 2000' top by making a short diversion to the true summit of Nine Standards Rigg at 2170', a mile to the south, before descending. However, no doubt most of the visitors on New Years Day will forego all this to immediately turn round and dash back by the same route to the finish of the race at Kirkby Stephen.

All proceeds from the race have been donated to charities supporting it's organisation, including Kirkby Stephen Mountain Rescue, Great North Air Ambulance, Lakeland SARDA, David Watt - a local SARDA handler - who tragically died in 2011, and was for many years a loyal supporter of the event.

#### And for the 'Geeks'

The Nine Standards Race has had many loyal supporters in it's 25 year history. Notable amongst these are:

Fraser Livesey, who has ran 19 successful attempts, and Wendy Dodds, who has completed a creditable 13 laps.

The greatest number of runners to take part was 123 in 1993, although recently numbers have dipped slightly.

Last year's race had 109 entrants, and it is hoped this is a trend which will continue.

Finally, sincere thanks must go to Kirkby Stephen Sports and Social Club, who have hosted the race registration, and presentations every year. This is a particularly selfless act on the part of the club committee and stewards who provide this service following the busiest night of the year.

Since 2005, Roland Bowman of Cumbria

Kendal Scaffolding has been the main race sponsor, and has kindly donated souvenirs and shirts to commemorate the 25th running of the race for the first 150 entrants in 2013.

I hope to see you all in 2013 were Pauline, Steve and I will be handing out T-Shirts and hopefully I might get a run if I'm sober enough!

A welcome break on the traverse of the Rumm Cuillin, and above: The end of the day



The club was founded in 1982 by Steve Flynn an Irish social worker on the back of the early 80s running boom. Training out of Hadfield School, the initial take-up was for road and trail but then, with an influx of fell runners, such as Fran Lowe and Bill Buckley, the harriers were enticed into getting their shoes much muddier by training and racing over a variety of terrain with growing success on the fells. For such a small club it was remarkable that a group of talented runners such as Andy Trigg, Mike Prady, Dave Ibbetson, Adi Jones and others were able to compete with the best fell runners in the country as was shown by the club's 3rd placing in the 1989 British Fell Championships

As well as prowess in fell races, the club always liked to contest multi-stage events like the Tour of Tameside, Saddleworth 3 Day event as well as local classics such as the Glossop Fell Race, Otter 40, Three Towers, Tankys, Downfall , Edale and Chew Valley Skyline Races etc. The club was also well represented at cross-country in the local Manchester and SE Lancs XC Leagues as well as in the Derbyshire XC Championships where the Mens Vets had a good record and in the National also.

Later in the decade, the Harriers began to train out of Glossop Leisure Centre. The club also put on several races through the 80s e.g. Glossop Half which was voted by Runners World as one of the best half-marathons in the country, Glossop 5 always attended by some of the finest road runners in the area and the Shelf Moor race where in 1989 British Champ elect Colin Donnelly broke the 40 minute barrier, a feat that has not yet been repeated. This was also the year when Mike Prady won an England vest racing in Die, France.

On the social side, the club put out regular witty informative eagerly anticipated newsletters, held a fancy dress Christmas Handicap from Glossop Rugby Club, and set up a very popular club championship which was keenly contested on fell, road and cross-country.

Further afield, the harriers were always well represented in events such as the KIMM, Old County Tops, and the Haworth Hobble.

#### The 90s

This decade saw the club making great strides on the participation, social and results side both locally and nationally with the early part of the decade being especially productive.

Trips to Scotland were very popular with a strong contingent making the long journey northwards to be regularly in evidence at both the Goat Fell race on Arran as well as at the Bens of Jura

Training nights became more structured with a full advertised programme of summer routes, hash runs, club orienteering events as well as fun, low-key informal events such as the Dog Rock Handicap Race where everybody was expected to cross the winning line at the same time. Nev's Fell Race ran in fancy dress, bring a prize take a prize, held on the Sunday before

Christmas from the Queens in Old Glossop, was also well attended by club members and friends from local clubs

As well as the increasingly popular club championship, the club also put on the Three Trig Challenge taking in Harry Hut, Cock Hill, Higher Shelf and a mystery checkpoint. Amongst those taking part were then members Mark Seddon and John Kewley who went on to win the 1995 KIMM Elite in the Brecon Beacons.

By this time the newsletter had grown into a more magnum opus which contained a wealth of running information as well as

recipes, poems and other creative offerings. The club was also was putting on annual presentation evenings as the membership increased.

In this decade Andy Trigg was at the top of his form and held many local race records which stood for several years. He was also to have success in the KIMM Elite and along with Adi Jones, who was 1997 V40 British Fell Champ, achieved results of which the small club could be justly proud. A variety of long distance challenges were also taken on by members including the Derwent Watersheds, BGR, Fellsman, Bullock Smithy and the Pikes Peak

By the mid 90s the club was hosting eight races i.e. Glossop Gallop, Lambs Leg, Herod Farm (originally Pennine) an inaugural Women's Fell Race, Up the Nab, New Glossop Fell Race (on a changed course to the earlier Dark Peak race featured in SMOTS) and the Shelf Moor Race which was selected as an English Fell Championship Race in 1997 when won by Gavin Bland.



#### The 00s and 10s

In 2000 Sally Newman became English Ladies Champion and subsequently represented England. The website (www.glossopdale.org.uk) was launched in 2000, a technological innovation which has evolved to include Facebook and, in May 2012, an official blogsite. All of these changes have gradually replaced the Harriers newsletters, the last of which was produced in 2006.

The early "noughties" seem to have been a time of change as a number of the elite runners headed for pastures new. Although Glossopdale featured less prominently in the results for a few years, nevertheless we were still active in all areas - short local races, longer distances and big events such as the Mountain Marathons. We have also managed (although it was sometimes touch and go) to enter at least one team in the various relay events (FRA, Ian Hodgson and Calderdale). Mark Ollerenshaw has finished first in the Bullock Smithy event and Sandra Cooper has had some notable results in races

such as the Kinder Trog. Glossopdale won the men's team prize in the 2011 Old County Tops, an exceptional result for a small club and in the recently held Calderdale Relays, the men placed ninth overall, the previous best result being 27th. Glossopdale Women also took the team prize in the inaugural Trigger race in January 2012. Julian Minshull, Mark Ollerenshaw, former member Jasmin Paris and John Doyle from Pennine were 1st mixed team and 2nd overall in the 2012 High Peak Mountain Marathon. In May 2012, four Glossopdale women successfully completed the Cumbrian Traverse, including an encounter with Joss Naylor at the foot of Great Gable.

The club provides a supportive and encouraging environment for people to push themselves and take on new challenges. To quote Sue Clapham (after this year's HPM):

"...you are amongst the kindest and loveliest people I'm fortunate enough to have as friends. Thank you all so very much for the pre-race advice, tips and maps ... pre-race reccying in crazy weather ... good luck emails, texts....not to





mention Beryl and Carl (Buckley) who appeared out of nowhere in the clag somewhere south of Alport Low....and John (Stephenson) who waited so patiently at the bottom of the infamous cow poo field..."

So after a dip, we seem to be having something of a renaissance at the Club, with talented newcomers performing well alongside club stalwarts. As an illustration, Tim Budd was voted "Best Newcomer" in 2011 and Nev McGraw (member since 1982) "Most Improved Runner". Bill Buckley was made a life member of the club in 2010.

In addition to the regular Tuesday and Thursday evening runs, we now have coaching sessions on Monday evenings covering aspects of speed, stamina and hillwork. Summer club runs focus on the hills and some choose to stick to the fells all year round, heading out with head and hand torches as the nights close in. The Club continues to organise two of the local races -Joe Barber Herod Farm, first race of the summer evenings and Shelf Moor, which has now featured twice as an English Championship Race.

GDH members recently experimented with foam-rollering to aid recovery. All photographic evidence of this workshop was considered too incriminating for publication; suffice to say it attracted enough participants to fill a scout hut!

A strong social side has built up over the last few years; club weekends away to the Lakes and Snowdonia and a full week in 2011 to the Islands of Eigg and Rum (complete with stunningly beautiful weather). We also celebrate Christmas with a lovely run in the snow (most years!) followed by buffet and prize-giving as well as

ad hoc get-togethers for birthdays and post-run jollities. It is also noticeable how many family memberships we have, youngsters following in their parents footsteps and couples who run and compete together and our away weekends are very much family orientated, including nonrunning activities.

Our 30th Anniversary Do (which will have taken place by the time the article appears) will be at Glossop Golf Club - a sit down meal for 90 followed by a ceilidh and with specially brewed "Bogtrotter" beer on tap to be supped from celebratory GDH mugs.

Looking to the future - we can confidently expect more good results and new members. We have plenty going on - the celebrations at the end of June; a week away in the remoteness of Knoydart in July; a trip abroad planned for 2013; a women's team for the HPM in 2013 and maybe a couple of Bob Graham attempts!

Incidentally, Dinting Viaduct (the key feature of our GDH logo) is currently undergoing a multimillion pound refurbishment. How fitting it would be if Network Rail could be persuaded to re-paint this structure in the fabulous blue and orange of Glossopdale Harriers!



## Running for Bill

#### Studmarks fom the Summit – a race in honour of Bill Smith

Bill Smith really enjoyed coming over to my races. I know this because he told me many times. In any case, I'm certain that he wouldn't have travelled over all the way from his home in Liverpool, more often than not by public transport – as he did to many other fell races – if he didn't enjoy them. He was always more than happy to help out with marshalling, assisting on the finish line or compiling the results in the pub afterwards at my Ogden Water and Summit Inn venues. After the prizegiving, we would always enjoy a drink or two at what Bill liked to call 'the social' in the pub afterwards. I once mentioned the fact that a copy of his book Studmarks On The Summits had been auctioned on ebay for £130 and asked what he thought. He simply said, "Well, I hope whoever bought it feels that they got their money's worth".

We would correspond by mail occasionally. often after I'd posted Bill a set of printed results from one of my races. His replies usually included a couple of interesting notes, sometimes about fellrunning in general – his life's passion – or perhaps an anecdote or incident from his own career or highlight of a recent fell walk.

In a letter dated September 2000, Bill told me that he was glad to hear that I'd enjoyed running at both the Turnslack and Kentmere races. He wrote; "I didn't do the latter though I generally do well in heatwave conditions, sometimes beating runners I wouldn't be anywhere near in normal conditions. I once won a championship race (o/60's) in this way! (It was the 1997 Winder Grind)"

He went on to tell me how he liked the Sedbergh Hills race, in which I'd competed the previous month. "I haven't run it for quite a few years mainly because it's generally the week before Grasmere Sports which I've been concentrating on for about 15 years or more now, though I used to have to run it under a different name (W. Wilson of Chorley).

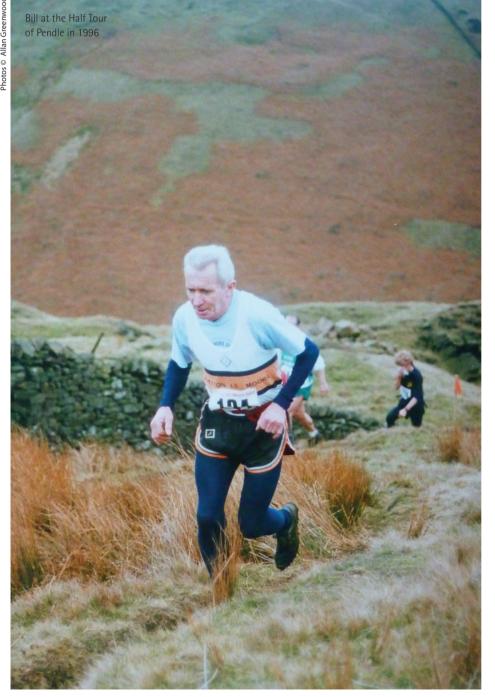
He had an eye for detail and a terrific memory. After the 2009 Windmills Whizz race when someone moved some flags and sent about half the field the wrong way, Bill wrote to me and told me how it had happened before. "This is by no means this first time some mischievous bugger has interfered with race flagging. I recall it happening around the mid or late '70's in the Three Towers race between Cadshaw and Entwistle station and in a Darwen Tower race of the early '80's."

In January last year he told me of a walk he had done the previous weekend from Warton near Carnforth. "I started over Warton Crag, then down to Craq Foot, Jenny Brown's Point on Morecambe Bay then inland via Silverdale Green and Leighton Moss, & back over the crag. About 7 or 8 miles with a lot of pleasant woodland walking - natural woodland not plantations. Weather sunny and cold with views of Ingleborough, Whernside, Bowland and South Lakeland fells etc".

I'm planning to do that route myself sometime very soon.

After I had heard the tragic news of his death in the Bowland fells, I wanted to pay tribute to Bill in my own way. What better way than to put on a new fell race and try to raise some money for a worthy cause that Bill himself supported. In one of his letters, Bill told me that his mother had died of cancer eighteen years ago. He had donated by direct debit to Cancer Research UK and to Marie Curie and Macmillan on a fairly regular basis.

He wrote to me shortly after my article 'Dad's



Run' was published in The Fellrunner (June 2011) and expressed his sympathies that I'd lost my Dad. Typically, Bill said he hoped Mum 'was managing to bear up alright', and asked me to pass on his sympathies.

Bill was always the first to offer praise if he had enjoyed my writing. This was especially heart warming coming from such a fine author. Of 'Dad's Run' he wrote, "Having now read it, I must say that despite its initially sad theme, I found it to be one of the finest articles to appear in the magazine for many a long year. Well done Allan".

Bill's historical writing puts mine in the shade. What a modest man.

I should add that Bill was kind enough to write a well researched and thoughtful foreward to a book that I once wrote - but that was never published - about the trials and tribulations of being a fell race organiser together with a history of my own fell races.

So, after a few training runs with Chris Smale from the Summit Inn near Littleborough, I came up with a new, and in my view fitting and exciting route for Bill's race. A cracking course of around five and a half miles and a big improvement on some of the previous routes I've tried up there. Frank and Bev at the pub agreed with the proposed date, a Sunday in late February and told me that they would be providing food.

Then I needed a race title. It just came to me one day as I was working in my garage sawing firewood. Studmarks From The Summit. Yes, Bill would have liked that!

As I had no idea of how many runners to expect, and as the pub wanted an idea for their catering purposes, I decided, for the first time in 21 years of fell race organising, to do a pre-entry race. Details were sent to the FRA, the event would form part of my 'Fell Race For Life' charity

race series.

Soon after New Year, entries started to trickle in. Then, come February it picked up until I was getting around half a dozen, sometimes ten entries a day.

George Arnold of Preston Harriers sent me his entry and enclosed, along with a very generous donation to our charity, a very touching letter. He thanked me for giving him "the opportunity to pay respect to Bill". He went on to tell me that he and Bill were almost exactly the same age and that they'd had many a good natured tussle over

"I very much miss seeing him supporting us and chatting to him afterwards - what a man! Perhaps it could be arranged that all us over 70's be introduced to each other and run together in Bill's race".

I wrote back telling George that I would allocate all the over 70's with numbers prefixed '7' so that they might easily find each other. But as for running together? Well, I kept quiet about that! It is of course still a race and I know runners. As soon as they get going and into racing mode... that's it, game on! I've often witnessed George racing out on those fells; he takes no prisoners!

George's letter started me thinking. What had started out as my own little low profile tribute to Bill had clearly struck a chord with many people. This was Bill's race, a celebration of a great man and friend to all. The event was also being recognised as a vehicle for raising money for charity. I had had a number of donations sent in, some with accompanying cards or notes, all gratefully received. Thankyou.

By the closing date, a week before the race, I had over 150 entries and I was still getting texts and calls asking whether entries had closed. I had a good idea of numbers now for food, so I just told everyone to come and enter on the day.

By now I had no less than seven over seventy runners entered; Bill's old mates. Roy Lee of Middleton Harriers would be 79 on race day, just over three weeks before his eightieth!

I flagged the course with Jackie on Saturday in good weather with cracking views from the Pennine Way. Sunday dawned fine, clear and sunny with a cold wind. Runners began to arrive at The Summit Inn and so Jackie and Peter Jebb got on with the job of dishing out race numbers and checking everyone's emergency contact details and car registration numbers against our master lists, while I erected a board with information and photo's of the great man. Claire and Nick arrived to help with on-the-day entries and Graham and Val Wright and Karen McIntosh came to officiate on the finish line. Kath Smale went out to marshal the gate by Leach Farm while Manhar Patel and Mick Fryer set off to marshal on the Pennine Way and Brian Horsley and Andy Thorpe came to sweep and gather the flags in. Thanks folks. George Arnold approached me with a hand written note, a few words that he wanted me to read out before the start. When I managed to find a spare couple of minutes, I sat and read it through – with a bit of a lump in my throat. Very kind and sincere sentiments; here is a snippet...



"Bill was a slight, inconspicuous man, but he was a giant in fell running circles...

He was so generous – a man with impeccable manners and such respect for his fellow runners. A father figure.

He supported fell running till the last – always there - giving encouragement to all.

His achievements in journalism and fell running are legendary. I'd like to think his spirit roams the fells watching over us. RUN THIS FOR BILL!".

As requested, I read this out before sending the field of just shy of 180 runners on their way and what a reaction! Spontaneous applause; for George and for Bill. Fantastic.

Every single runner set off feeling great. By the finish, Jack Ross had opened up a lead of two and a half minutes. The 18 year old from Stoke on Trent crossed the finish line in 32:06, with Rossendale's Ashley Holt in second place. Third was Halifax Harrier Joe Crossfield, with first veteran over 40 Chris Smale next in. Saddleworth's Chris Davies, a regular competitor at my races, won the over 50's section yet again, while another regular, Ken Taylor of Rossendale took the over 60's award. The over 70 men didn't exactly wait around for each other (!) and this hard fought race was headed by Bowland's Phil Martin, not far in front of George Arnold himself!

Anne Johnson of Calder Valley was the first woman to finish, beating Accrington's Debbie Gowans by the short margin of 18 seconds and three places, Debbie taking the over 40's prize. Anne later told me that she had thought of Bill while on the long climb towards the White

Sarah Yeomans of Rossendale placed third and Christine Whitaker (Wharfedale) won the over 50's, Apologies to Jean Rawlinson (Clayton) who was the first over 60 lady, though due to

an oversight I did not announce this on the day, though Radcliffe's Sheila McNulty was first in the over 65 age group.

I should add at this point that while I was marking out the finish loop with flags and tape, an elderly chap approached me, asking if I was the organiser. He told me that he was an old mate of Bury's Jim Smith (Todmorden Harriers) and that he would like to give me a donation to my charity. He handed me what I thought was a twenty pound note and I thanked him sincerely, but on closer inspection I found that he'd handed me FIVE twenty pound notes. I think he said his name is Chris Simcock or Silcock. Anyway, thank you so very much Sir.

I received a lot of favourable comments about the course, some people asking whether it might become an annual fixture, and another telling me that it is an improvement on the Race To The Summit route, referring to the event held here in October.

Well, we will see. Anyway, one thing is for sure, Bill would have been happy that the Fell Race For Life series has - to date - raised a total of around £1500 for Marie Curie cancer care. This includes Windmills Whizz proceeds and over a hundred pounds in donations collected at the Rossendale Liver Hill race for which I am very grateful to the organisers.

The final race in the series will be the 'Running Bear' Race You To The Summit in October.

## Charlesworth Chase

#### Simons Seat Fell Race - Saturday 19th May 2012



When asked as a fell runner the best way to remember your wedding anniversary, the answer has to be "Organise a race the morning of the wedding and turn it into an annual event."

As we head down to Kinlochewe the early morning sun shimmered on Loch Maree, stretching away between Beinn Eighe and Slioch. Looks as if the Highlander is living up to its reputation - fine weather combined with fantastic terrain.

My partner, Brian Layton, veteran of over 120 mountain marathons and myself were competing in the score class, attempting to win the vets handicap. Don't ask, but yes, we do get a good handicap now we're past 45!

A short walk to the start and we were soon checking out over 30 grid refs - circles already on the map but codes and values to append. It was some 20 minutes after the start time that we commenced the first climb of over 2000 ft. A good warm up for our seven hour first day. Three controls in the bag and some impressive views.

Descending to our next control we found the controller, who thought I looked knackered. And this at 9.30am! Nice thing about the score is the lack of bodies around and as we progressed with only an occasional sighting of other competitors it turned into one of those 'glad to be alive days'. As always we were anxious to use all of our available time but hadn't counted on being unable to cross a gorge after the penultimate control. Short of abseiling we had to continue at right angles to our intended destination. Clambering out from our crossing point we sprinted to the last control with about 3 minutes to spare. This one was on the lochside and the overnight camp was 1km away on the other side of the water. Rigid inflatables ferried us over and still the sun shone!

Set up camp, ate the provided meal - beer and a ceilidh - a welcome relief from the challenges of the day.

Overnight "A" class leaders Mark and Jacqui Higginbottom defending a 15 minute lead led the chasing start on Sunday as snow stated to fall on the hills. By 8.30am the campsite was clear of competitors, as we seemed to be last away.

Starting with a 5km run we soon got into the centre of the controls, and at 1600ft we were rewarded with some fine running in powdered snow, picking up controls on a 300 degree trip around Mealle a Ghiuthias - no I can't pronounce it either.

Descending back to Kinlochewe I found myself falling further behind Brian as I tired on boggy terrain and we finished 7 minutes late.

The BBC were filming the event for the

Adventure Show and crossing the finishing line a cameraman approached. Ah my moment of fame! The camera went down by my feet and filming commenced. I had cut my hand on the hills and he was only interested in a trail of blood I inadvertently left on the floor of the village hall.

Only one of the Day 1 leaders won on the 2nd day but all retained their overall leads.

Prizes appeared to be for about a third of competitors and Brian and myself did get the vets handicap.

This has got to be one of the best 2-day events with the planners and controller coming up with really great courses year after year. Why not try a trip to the Highlands next spring?

## Eric Mitchell

#### The 88 year old who should have qualified for the London Olympics

Eric Mitchell is a Life Member and the President of Dark Peak Fell Runners, Now 88, he began fell running as a 50 year old and has set many age records, mostly over long distances. Here Eric talks about his first sport, cycling, then fell running and the enthusiasm he still has for the outdoors.

"I was born in Disley 88 years ago. I've just had my 88th birthday. My father was a signalman on the railway. My younger brother Roy went into cycling, my wife Edna was a time-trialling cyclist; and her brother also a time-triallist. We married in 1947 and later had two daughters. Edna did time-trialling until Lynne was born in 1952. Jan was born three years later.

We used to cycle to races. We rode to Solihull in Birmingham the night before. There was no traffic then. We'd cycle back after a race. Edna took up walking with Buxton Rambling Club, and has done many walks like the Coast to Coast and the Pennine Way.

I began work as an electrician in 1941 when I was 18. I was in a reserved occupation - an electrician at a bakery which kept the population going with bread. After the war I started cycle racing. Sport got going after the War. I joined

the British League of Racing Cyclists, and should have been in the London Olympics in 1948. It was a bit complicated. All to do with politics. We were rebels to the organisation - the NCU (National Cyclist Union). We wanted road racing proper and the NCU wouldn't allow that, and we were suspended. That's why I didn't do the London Olympics, but we were the best riders.

We lived in New Mills then and I cycled to work at a bakery in Manchester. That's how I got fit. I used to do 14 miles each way for six days a week. That was my training.

1947 was a cold winter. I used to ride on the main A6 to work when the snow was down, and I'd fall off my bike ten times each way.

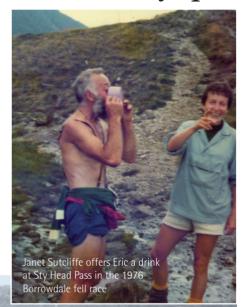
My most memorable moment was in the Cycling World Championship in Zurich. In 1946 I got to Zurich on the train. Down to Dover, sail across and it took a full day to get there. I crashed out. It was not my fault.

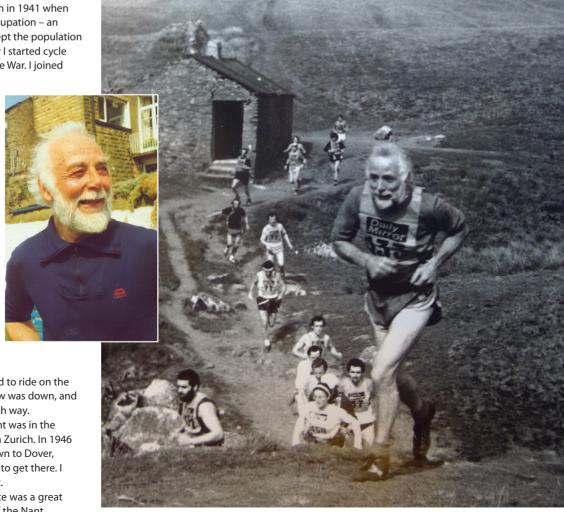
The London to Holyhead race was a great race. I punctured on the top of the Nant Ffrancon Pass. Five of us were away. You

changed your own in them days. Put a new tyre on. Pumped it up and was away. I was on my own. I stood a chance of placing that day. It was unfortunate. No spare wheels.

In the Lyon to Paris three-day race I was leading into Paris, but got caught with about two miles to go. Otherwise I would have won the race.

After my cycle racing was over, I did motor cycle scrambling for about ten years. Then I met Ted Dance who got me into fell running. My first fell race was the Skiddaw race in 1973 when I was 50. I did it with Roger Baumeister and after we said, 'well, I don't think we disgraced ourselves.' We've kept going ever since. Round about then, Lynne was the first back in the Four Three Thousand Footers from Keswick. Our daughter Jan now lives in France, and has run the Otter 40 here in Buxton. Now (he shows a

picture of Jan on a bike against a snow-covered backdrop) she is into Cycling Sportives. Here she is on the Col du Galibier in the Alps.

I was living up at Long Hill, Buxton and did all my fell training from there. By then I was a self-employed electrician. It was good for training up there. When I worked at a mill in Chinley I did three days a week there, and used to run over there by Combs Edge. That was good. With some of the lads who were around then we used to get some long runs in at weekend. That was my fell training.

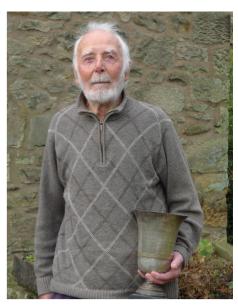
For the fells I used to do about 70 miles a week.

Including long walks. Up on Combs Edge the gamekeepers used to chase us, but they couldn't catch us. No way – because they didn't like us going up on Combs Edge. A lot of atrocities went on with the wild life – gamekeepers trapping and poisoning and all the rest of it. I didn't like that. So we rebelled against it. They couldn't catch us 'cos they weren't fit enough. This was before we had freedom to roam.

With Chris Worsell I said 'we need a fell running club'. And so Dark Peak was born. That was well over twenty years ago. Now I'm a Life Member and President of Dark Peak Fell Runners.

In 1977 I did the Bob Graham. I seemed to go for the longer fell races. Borrowdale, Edale Skyline, Marsden to Edale. I liked all these. They tell me I've set records at 50, 60 and 70 years of age. I'm proudest of those I set from 1994 to 1996 as a veteran over 70. There are fifteen records I had. All my records will have gone now.

I liked the Marsden to Edale. It was one of my favourites along with the Borrowdale.

Daughter Jan went to live on the Isle of Wight and we went there to visit on holiday. They said the Fire Brigade are doing their cross-country race at weekend. You can run if you like. I said, 'right'. I won the race and beat all the firemen. (Eric laughs) It was cross-country. I'd be fifty odd then.

I used to do the Three Peaks Cyclo-Cross. I know Nick Craig who has won it three times. Nick's father set me off on this. I went out with him one day. Ay, 'You'll be OK,' he said after a ride 'you should enter the Three Peaks Cyclo-Cross'. I won the veterans prize. I've done it a few times.

You don't need much for fell running – a decent pair of studded shoes, a Helly Hansen Lifa top and a good cag. At 73 I thought I had done enough fell running so I retired.

Now I walk a lot. I still get out even though I've had a heart operation."

## Over the fells on two wheels John Rownsley - 3 Peaks Man

With over 150 circuits of the Three Peaks as a runner, cyclist and walker under his belt. John Rawnslev must know them backwards. In this, the 50th year he has organised the Cyclocross race, we delve into the life and times of an incredible man.

Five months after the Three Peaks running race comes the annual cyclo-cross race. This year is the 50th time, an occasion to celebrate a special event in the sporting world. Fell runners have done it 'just for fun' yet it is dubbed "the World's Toughest Cyclo-cross race."

Those who have enjoyed this crossover event can trace their allegiance to Barry Davies in the early 1970's. The former AAA junior steeplechase champion with East Cheshire Harriers became a cyclo-cross specialist and was perhaps the first to traverse the Pennine Way by cycle. In 1973. Davies, then 26, secured his first win in the 'Peaks'. Peter Walkington, then a former FRA general secretary, was runner-up. The allure of the 'Peaks' still entices Walkington who will be at Helwith Bridge for the 50th celebrations. John North, the FRA Chairman from 1976 to 1978. who won the 1980 event will be there too. Alan Evans was another from this era who enjoyed some success in this unique event, returning in 2010 to be the best 70+ year-old. Many more have also survived and endured some of the fun that is peculiar to this race. Nick Craig, last year took the title for the third time and followed after his late father, lan, who was victorious

on the third promotion of this classic. All past winners have been invited to attend as either competitors or spectators this year.

But this article is not about the runners and riders: it is about John Rawnsley. After a mindblowing 50 times from 1961 to 2012 (two were cancelled due to foot and mouth) as the key man, he is handing over the reins this year.

John takes up the story: "I got off to a good start and was physically fit at Bradford Grammar School where a friend, James Hall, was a very good cyclist. We used to race home after school up a three quarter mile hill. We were neck and neck and James suggested that I enter a cycle race. We built up a racing bike and, starting in January 1954, went for training rides with local riders including Doug Petty and Geoff Clark, two of Yorkshires best riders. My first race of 45 miles from Skipton was for novices, I finished 8th. Then James and I went to Hull for a 50-mile race in which he was first and I was second. The following year, 1955, I went to work in France. During that time I rode in eight races, went touring in the Alps and watched the Tour de France on the summit of the Col du Galibier."

"In 1959 the Yorkshire Cyclo-cross Association was formed and I went onto the committee. I have now been its President for 35 years. As I became more involved in the new sport of cyclocross with more and more races in Yorkshire, my road racing wound down."

The Three Peaks Cyclo-cross came about as a result of Kevin Watson, a 14 year-old Skipton



schoolboy who decided to cycle the Peaks in 1959 having watched the running race. His time was 6 hrs 54 mins. Shortly after Malcolm Renshaw, with some Leeds CTC members, rode round and then members of Bradford Racing Cycling Club. John joined this club in 1960 and in October they decided to cycle the Three Peaks again. The previous times were reduced to 4 hrs 31 mins. After this ride they met Norman Thornber who had donated the main (carved) trophy for the Three Peaks Running Race. He asked what they were doing and offered to carve a trophy for it, if it were organised. John said, "I'll organise it if I can ride in it."

He goes on to say, "The first race I organised attracted 40 riders and I won it in a sprint finish from my great friend and rival, Harry Bond. The route then was 25 miles and we never went across country from Pen-y-Ghent. We went back down the lane, up the road to Ribblehead and straight up Whernside. I couldn't get permission to go from the Hill Inn so I got a route further down the road. It was a beeline, an absolutely horrendous climb to the summit of Ingleborough. Winning the race in 1961 and being second in 1974 at the age of 37 are two of the highlights for me. Harry Bond got his revenge in 1962 when we had a few more entries. In 1963 we had low cloud and poor conditions. A chap from Lancaster, lan Craig, won and my Bradford club took the next four places. In 1964 Harry Bond won and I was second."

"In the 1960s I rode 150 to 200 miles a week, had a full-time job and raised a family. Then I did all the work myself. From 1978 to 1982 we had

Andrew Bros, a BMW dealer in Bradford as our main sponsor. After this we did not seek a replacement, but have had many generous donations."

1979 saw a Belgian team come over that included Norbert Dedecker who had been World Cyclo-cross Champion. In 1980 some Swiss riders came, but were beaten by John North, a fantastic runner who took up cycling. The following year Swiss riders returned and Arthur Manz won. From then on the numbers grew. In 1983 the start moved to Helwith Bridge and the sequence of the peaks changed. The route went up the road through Horton and approached Ingleborough from Simon Fell. Whernside was next and then back down the road to Horton, to tackle Pen-y-Ghent via the Pennine Way lane. The race has started from Helwith Bridge ever since and the Yorkshire Subterranean Club provides excellent facilities at their clubhouse. The race has grown like Topsy. Last year there were 673 entrants of whom 597 started and 565 finished. The route is now 38 miles with 20 off road. The record time is a phenomenal 2 hours 52 minutes, set by eight times winner, Rob Jebb.

John continues, "For the Peaks I have ridden the cyclo-cross race 45 times and organised it 50. Neil Orrell has also ridden 45 times but since having a hip replaced hasn't been able to add to his total. In 1974 Barry Davies' Pennine Way record of 3 days, 3 hours and 33 minutes captured my imagination. In the hot summer of 1976 I attempted the Pennine Way on a bike, navigating on my own, beginning at Edale at mid-day on July 1st. The next day I went from Crowden to Langdon Beck and drank 24 pints of liquid en route. After a stop north of Hadrian's Wall, I did it in 2 days 23 hours and 27 minutes. I was the first person to traverse the Pennine Way in under 3 days - which I couldn't have done without support from my wife, Brigitte, and my good friend Malcolm Renshaw. Two years later John North broke my record with 2 days and 12 hours. No one has attempted it since."

"In 1960 I joined Bingley Harriers and did a bit of running in the winter. It really helped my cyclo-cross. I was running 50 miles a week and doing the Three Peaks running race at the end of April. My first race was in 1966 and by 1974 I'd got my time down to 3:20:32 from the Hill Inn. Then the start moved to Horton where I did 3:37 and I kept competing and finishing until 2000 when I was timed out by one minute at Ribblehead. I have completed 45 cyclo-cross races, 30 running races and walked it a grand total of 152 times. The last time was in 2009 when I went with an 80 year-old lady from our walking club who did it in under the 12 hours. She has marshalled for us for the last 20 years at a very important point for riders descending Ingleborough."

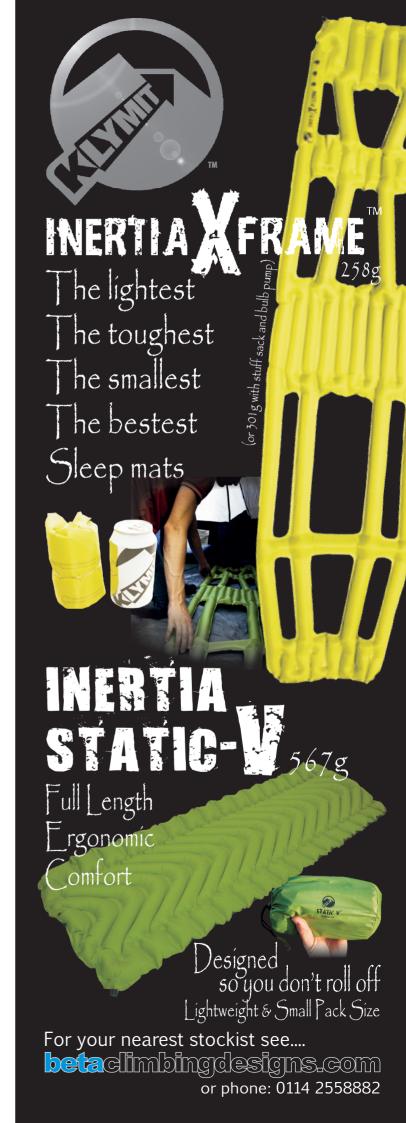
"In the 1970's and 80's I ran other fell races: Ben Nevis in 2 hrs 5 mins, Ennerdale, Kentmere etc and became interested in long distance events like the Haworth Hobble, Fellsman and the Lakes Three Thousand Footers which I found very challenging. In 1989, at 52, I made an unsuccessful Bob Graham Round attempt but returned the following year to succeed in 23 hours 27 minutes. I went anti-clockwise and Alan Evans ran the last leg from Threlkeld alongside me to spur me on."

"I have organised the Three Peaks event for so long now that it has become second nature to me. Since its inception I have done all the work myself, and now I have Sportident taking the entries for me to confirm acceptances. I have had some extremely good helpers over the years. Keith Parkinson is our web-master and assistant organiser alongside Martin Hanson who owns the field at Helwith Bridge. I have had an amazing amount of help from the mountain rescue and volunteers on all three peaks. From the early days the South Ribble M.R.T. covered for us and continues to do so as the Bowland Pennine M.R.T. Last year they had 36 registered helpers and nine apprentices. In addition the race needs a lot of marshals and other helpers."

"For the 50th race we already have riders from Spain, Italy and Switzerland expressing an interest. This includes the famous ex-World Champion Cyclo-cross rider, Thomas Frischnecht. We did ask Lance Armstrong, but he is already booked to do an Ironman event in mid September. It would be fantastic if he were able to compete."

"My ambition, at the start, was to organise and compete in 50 Three Peaks Cyclo-cross races. Ill health five years ago has prevented me doing the latter, but at 75 I still cycle every week and have recently joined a new local cycling group in Leyburn. I also regularly lead walks in the Yorkshire Dales for various groups. For me the last 50 Three Peaks races have flown by, but I'm not sure my long-suffering wife would agree."

Now John can put up his feet and have some fun himself.



# The Bunny Runs

### A great learning curve 21 and still growing

These races have become a great learning curve for many youngsters, with the likes of Alistair and Jonny Brownlee, Mark Buckingham, Graham Pearce, Marc Scott, Sam Tosh, Ben Livesey, Matt Pierson, Ian Wellock, Sam Watson and all the Addison family (Tom, Mark, Jos and Rory) all having competed as juniors over the past twenty one years. Junior girls who are still competing now are Sharon Taylor, Natalie White, Holly Page, Emma Flanagan, Lucy Needham nee Griffiths, Mel Hyder, Louise Pickles and Haywood duo of Blue and Bo. The reason for the races success is very simple: lots and lots of chocolate, a course which allows the youth to test their speed against the seniors and often beat them and finally FUN!

Fun is the reason why world triathlete champions Alistair and Jonny had made the races a must in their youth, they even cheekily entered the races under the club 'Yorkshire Youngsters'; Ali first competed in 2000, finishing 57th from 228 runners while Jonny finished 102nd in 2002 from 234 runners and Ali won the U16 title nine times. Even youngest brother Edward has joined in the fun, all having been introduced to the chocolate mayhem by dad Keith, another competitor. To mark the marvellous achievement of the Brownlee brothers being selected to compete in the triathlon at the London Olympics in August, the numbers for each race depicted a different Bunny picture of them and an eggcellent message to encourage them to succeed in their quest to attain an Olympic medal. Neither has yet won a bunny, but Ali has vowed to win one in 2013, there's even a bet on it!

### BR1-Freaky weather

Just a few days previously the country was bathed in sunshine and 23 degree temperatures, great sunbathing weather, but there was no chance of that on Penistone Hill, as it was a case of finding layers to put on for the 302 runners, with freezing temperatures, strong winds and a blizzard to contend with.

Recent winner of the Baildon Boundary off road half, Ilkley Moor and the Soreen Stanbury Splash, Tom Adams, stormed to his third win and sixth Egg Stage win. Not bad for someone who first appeared in 2005 and managed to finish 55th in 21-59.

Tom, fifth at the first English championship race at Lads Leap, will now have the honour of taking care of Jorge the perpetual cuddly rabbit trophy. 'Why Jorge?' you may ask. Well that is because it is named after the course record holder Jorge Thomas.

### The 2012 Bunny Runs have been the subject of enquiries from the FRA. As a result the 2013 Bunny Runs will have to be policed very strictly.

The reason is that numerous breaches of the FRA Rules for Competition, the FRA Safety Requirements for fell races and the FRA Welfare Policy occurred by juniors with the support of their parents deliberately avoiding compliance with the FRA rules, ie Age as at 1st January 2012.

Despite the three registration desks having qualified club coaches manning them and taking down the information. signs displayed with the race rules and ages, all entry forms having Age as at 1st January 2012, the woodentops website and the FRA Forums having the same information, there were still some juniors who mistakenly entered thinking they were ok to compete.

For the 2013 races, any under age runners breaching the FRA rules will receive a race ban from the organiser if they compete.

BR1 winner, Tom Addison, gave chase to finish second, with his cousin Mark third and in fourth was 2011 U16 English champion James Hall.

Bunny girl Katie Walshaw, winner of the lan Roberts race, won for the seventh time and took her sixth Egg Stage. In second overall and first FU14 was Elizabeth Greenwood and in third was FU16 Molly Traviss.

Not even the weather could dampen the spirits of the runners at the prize giving, maybe it was the home made soup and roll, the warmth of the Old Sun Inn or the yummy prize chocolate Easter eggs, who knows, but it was packed! To round the evening off 2011 FU14 English silver medallist Elizabeth Greenwood helped Dave and Eileen with the legendary chocolate throw out, if you didn't catch anything, maybe you need to practice that part of the sport.

BR2 – Its now 31 up & counting for Ian

Everyones favourite fell runner and Mr. Bunny, Ian Holmes, once again proved the master of the course by winning for the thirtyfirst time, showing that injury will never stop him from displaying his prowess at these races, as he was the only one to break sixteen minutes on the windy showery night, in a field of 301. 'I decided to run to show Andy Peace how to do it. I was surprised to be so near the youngsters after the Egg Stage, because since the Borrowdale race when I damaged my knee, I have only managed around 20-30 miles a week. I caught James crossing the boggy section, there Max put a big spurt in after being cheered on, which was his undoing because of the strong head wind,' said the now 46 year old.

lan has competed in most of races for the past twenty years now, having first appeared in the

second running of the event in 1993 when he finished second to Greg Hull. He is also amongst an elite crowd, who twenty years on are still competing: Malcolm Coles, Colin Moses, Robin Bradbury, Tom McDonald, Paul Mitchell, Pauline and Lindsey Oldfield.

Youth was allowed to fight it out for the Egg Stage choc and U16 Max Wharton, the 2011 English Uphill champion had the speed to fend off the 2011 English U16 and Yorkshire champion James Hall. Max looks to be putting his injuries behind him now and finished third behind James, who was fresh from winning the U16 race at Pendle. Seth Waterman won the U14, Alan Wright the V50 and Steve Carter again the V60.

Katie Walshaw, having just won Pendle fell race three days ago in a very fast 35-37 in sixteenth overall, still had the speed in her legs to equal Scary Mary Wilkinson's 2007 Egg Stage time of 3-59, an astonishing feat. The 27 year old only faltered towards the end of the race to miss Mary's course record by seven seconds and considering the weather that record should be within her grasp as she finished twelfth overall. Former FU14 and FU16 Bunny champ Mel Hyder who was third at Pendle, finished second with Jo Buckley third. Elizabeth Greenwood and Molly Traviss dominated the FU14 and FU16 categories again.

This race also celebrated the eighteenth birthday of Rosie Hellawell in true Bunny fashion, with an elite number and her having to wear bunny ears and a bob tail. At the prize giving it was a raucous rendition of 'happy birthday', a multi signed birthday card, flashing bunny ears and an ultimate giant cupcake, before the finale where the Keighley and Craven athlete helped throw out the Cadbury crème eggs, sweets, haribos etc. to the eager mad crowd, what a way

to spend your birthday!

### BR3-'Run for my bunny'

'I didn't think I was going to be able to keep that young whippet James at bay, he certainly gave me a run for my bunny, said now four times winner Tom Adams. 29 year old Tom, the Egg Stage record holder, made the race a procession, storming away from the off to win in 3-29 with ease for the seventh time. But it was U16 James Hall, who first hopped onto the route in 2008 finishing 68th at BR2 in 20-03 to finish fourth U14, who lit up the night with another second place overall and a new U16 record, taking ten seconds off his own mark. He finished ten seconds down on Tom, but had U23 Yorkshire champion Fred Slemeck and four times BR winner Willy Smith in his wake. James made history by being the first BU16 to become the series winner with a fourth and two second places and will now be immortalised on the bunny beer label and wins a case of beer! Don't worry folks his dad Roger is ok with it.

Seth Waterman won the U14 category again, Andy Brown the V40, Alan Wright again the V50 and Steve Carter again the V60, while evergreen Malcolm Coles the V70.

Katie Walshaw, fresh from finishing eighth on leg one of the National 6 Stage Road Relays the previous weekend, won that chocolate again for the eighth time in a fast 4-02. Katie is also equal top of the carrot with Kath Drake on nine BR wins now and looks certain to take that crown next year, while her photo will star on the series bunny beer again for the third year. Durham University student Holly Page, third and first FU23 at Lads Leap, finished second, whilst Pendle race FU14 winner Elizabeth Greenwood took third. Kath Farquhar, Katies coach won the FV40 again,



Margaret Jagan the FV60 again and 2010 FV50 English champion Gill Myers returned to win that chocolate category.

### BR Relay - Pretenders take the crown

Max Wharton, Bradley Traviss and James Hall who called themselves 'The Young Pretenders' took the relay crown, showing the other 86 teams how easy it is to transport the pink egg baton round the 1.5 mile loop. Max the Anniversary Wa U16 winner ran the fourth fastest time of the night, Bradley the Anniversary Wa U18 winner ran the fifth fastest and James, 26th in the U17 London Mini Marathon, ran the fastest time at 9-25, which now ranks him fifth on the all

time leader board just behind a Mr. A. Brownlee.

James Logue, part of the 'Lancs and Paddy' team, ran second fastest on the night and helped Tim Ellis and Shaun Godsman to second team overall. In third came the solo team 'Only the Lonely' made up of Tom Adams, who left the team, 'The has beens' consisting of Andy Peace, Ian Holmes and Andy Brown, in his wake. 'The has beens' consolation was winning the V40 title and setting a new record by nearly two minutes.

Holmfirth Harriers supplied several winners, among them the first family team, with Lewis Byram running two legs along with dad Wayne to finish eighth team.

'Lone bunny', Katie Walshaw made history by being the first solo female to hare round the Penistone Hill course, although Sarah Rowell did successfully manage that on the old Harden Moor route. Katie recorded a time of 33-31 to finish 12th overall and in the process record the three fastest times of the night, 11-01, 11-11 and 11-19, so she now holds four of the fastest ever leg times, only Helen Glover in second spoils a clean sweep.

Anniversary Wa FU14 winner Erica Byram teamed up with sis Lucy and Olivia Sykes who was fresh from finishing 29th at the FU13 Mini London Marathon. These girls all wore bunny ears, bob tails and face paint to win the FU14 goodies. Known as the 'Pesky Kids' last year, the 'Pesky Bunnys' this time round broke their own record by 33 seconds. A Holmfirth 'Topless trio of Indians' in the form of Andrew Farquhar, Lewis Bartholomew and Seth Waterman won the first fancy dress team prize.

In the mixed category it was the 'Won Millions' with dad Mark, mum Rebecca and son Ruaridh, just ahead of the first ladies team, 'Too hot to Handley' where Beckie Taylor ran twice with Grace Handley. Caroline Harrison, Sharon Newbold and Patsy Hall showed mums can be record breakers by taking the FV40 title with the aptly named team, 'Trying to run as fast as our sons', so watch out sons, your mums are after you!



### Why Running?

### By BU14 Bunny and Greater Manchester Fell Champion George Lewis of East Cheshire Harriers

I will do any event possible on the track and field. as well as doing cross country, road, and fell. This summer, I am participating in the English Fell Running Championship for the first time. I have a younger sister called Megan, who runs for East Cheshire Harriers like me. I believe that it is great to have a younger sibling as they can use you as their role model. They can also use your achievements to inspire their own personal targets as they develop as athletes.

I have been running since I was in year 6, when my headmistress, Mrs McGowan, asked Schools Cross Country Championship. I agreed and ended up leading our school Holden Clough Primary to its first ever trophy. Since then I have achieved several other accolades

if I wanted to take part in the Tameside Primary at cross country including: Year 7 Tameside

Schools Champion, Year 7 Greater Manchester Schools Champion, second in the Greater Manchester U13 Championships and on the fells Greater Manchester U14 Champion in 2011 and 2012. This year I was chosen to represent my county Greater Manchester in the Inter Counties XC. I was also selected to run for my region North West in the London Mini Marathon. Unfortunately, this clashed with the second round of the English Junior Fell Running championship, at the Anniversary Wa! So no chance of a hoodie for me or any of the others selected to represent their counties in London. what a shame! On the track and field I have been awarded the Greater Manchester Champion title at 100 metres, 200 metres, 1500 metres, High Jump and Long Jump.

Running is not my only activity. I also participate in badminton, tennis, football, hockey and golf. Basically. I will give any sport a go as long as it's not javelin throwing. I am also a member of a local Scouts troop, Second/ First Hurst and last year had the privilege to go to South Africa to work in a wildlife sanctuary. Whilst I enjoyed the heat in Africa, back in the UK I will run in any conditions, which has showed over the last few Tuesdays at the Bunny Runs, where I won the under 14's age category in pouring rain!

I have a wide selection of supporters who spur me on, but my main ones are my mum, Susan, dad, Martin, sister and grandparents. Although one set of grandparents live in

Spain, they still get regular updates from my dad. When my grandad, Ron visits he does try to come and watch me race. This is probably because he used to be a good club runner himself many years ago.

East Cheshire Harriers organise a yearly trail race in July, a route which takes us through Daisy Nook and Park Bridge. It was a family affair last year with me, dad and my sister, Megan, running it. We hope to repeat the experience this year.

A normal training week for me consists of many sessions: Monday & Thursday with Eddie Shaw doing speed work; Tuesday with Shirley Aldridge in Daisy Nook, running up and down the hills there; Wednesday's training with Eddie varies, in the summer I do field events such as high jump and long jump, whereas in the winter we go to our gym followed by a long slow run.

I hope my article has gone someway to explaining my life as a dedicated runner and the passion which inspires it.





### I run because I love it, not because I have to

I started running four years ago when I was 14. at the time I was a keen swimmer and also attended dancing classes several times a week. My parents have always been keen fell runners and so I decided to give it a go. I first started running with my dad a few times a week and seeing the small improvements in my fitness and speed made me determined to keep going. At this age most runners had already been running for several years so ever since it has been a game

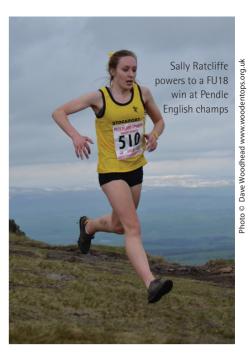
I joined East Cheshire Harriers and competed in track and cross-country soon after taking up running. I never had any outstanding performances in the first few years, but getting personal bests and improving my positions in cross country races meant I was slowly but surely improving all the time. I was training with a strong group of girls my age and I gradually worked my way up into the team. In 2010, Georgia Taylor-Brown, Emma Peters, Katie Reynolds and myself won the Northern Road Relays and the Northern Cross Country Relays, which set us up nicely for the bigger cross country's in 2011; at the Northern Cross, we placed first team and then placed third team at

the National.

Following this success. I decided to take up fell running. My parents always suggested I should compete on the fells when I was younger, but I never really enjoyed the gruelling challenge of steep ascents and rough ground. However living near Saddleworth on the edge of the Pennines has made me embrace the hills and now I love the challenge of them.

I competed in the FRA English Junior Championships last year and although I was pleased to come second overall, I knew I could do better in the individual race positions. With it being my first year of racing on the fells I lacked confidence and the mentality needed to produce a better performance. I was determined to improve on my positions so I decided to focus on the championship in 2012.

This year didn't get off to a great start, I picked up a knee injury over Christmas and found myself unable to run over January and February. In March I started to run, but was only able to run on soft ground so I could only train on the fells. This definitely made me stronger and running up hills so regularly helped me regain my fitness pretty quickly. As I started running



again, I changed clubs to Stockport Harriers. Andy Owen, my coach and a smaller group of athletes were moving there, and I thought a fresh start after a break would be good for me so I moved too. I tend to train once or twice a week with this group, I have become more independent now and train either with my dad or on my own. Andy is a great coach, he supports and encourages me at both races and training and helps me decide on the specific sessions I need to do to improve. Moving to Stockport has also given me the opportunity to consult with England junior team manager Bashir Hussain and adapt my training programme to focus on





mountain and fell running.

I tend to do two to three sessions a week. consisting of tempo runs, hill reps and speed sessions on the track. The days in between the sessions are typically spent going for easy recovery runs or resting. My favourite training is a long run on Sunday as it gives you time to enjoy running and you don't have to worry about keeping to times or pushing yourself too much. My least favourite session is faster reps on the track as I don't have much speed, chasing down the other members of my group makes the reps quite exciting and makes me train really hard. It's always satisfying to complete a tough track session. I usually swim at least once a week as well to have a break from running and add a bit of variety to my training.

Over Easter, I did the Bunny Run series for the first time, as they looked fun and exciting. They definitely did not disappoint! The weather conditions changed every week, which made every race different and varied. I thoroughly enjoyed the races and the course made it all the

more exciting, as it was a rollercoaster of hills and bends with fast sections and slower sections. The prize giving was also the best I've ever seen. There were Easter eggs stacked up to the ceiling and it was impossible to leave without armfuls of chocolate! I love these races as they are so competitive, but so much fun at the same time.

I've attended FRA junior training camps in the last year, which were combined with the Welsh squads. I found these really useful, as there were many coaches and athletes there who were able to offer advice and ideas on training, racing and other lifestyle choices. We were able to have question and answer sessions with elite mountain and fell runners and learn about their experiences. There is also a great social side to the training camps and staying with a big group who all share the same love for running makes them really enjoyable.

Other than running, I enjoy swimming at Saddleworth Swimming Club and have recently taken my level One coaching qualification, so I can help coach the younger swimmers in the

club. I love this job and I hope I can continue to coach swimming or athletics in the future. Aside from sport, I am taking A levels this summer in Biology, Maths and Physical Education and hope to go to Loughborough University to study Sports Science in September.

My parents have always been very encouraging and supportive of my running and I really appreciate this. They both come and support me at races or training, and are forever taxiing me around the country, but are never pushy or strict with me. My dad is the best training partner, he has a wealth of experience and he takes me up onto the fells away from home and is forever finding new routes for our

I don't have many long term goals at the moment, I just want to keep improving and see how far I can get, I like to take one year at a time, because set backs such as injury can have a devastating effect. But most of all I want to enjoy myself and run because I love it, not because I

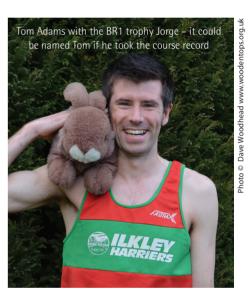
At number one, the Addison's turned up to make things a little more interesting. As usual I went off far too quick, but took the Egg Stage, only to immediately regret it after the build up

Thank you to all my friends, family and the people at Bingley Harriers who have supported me in all the races and competitions.

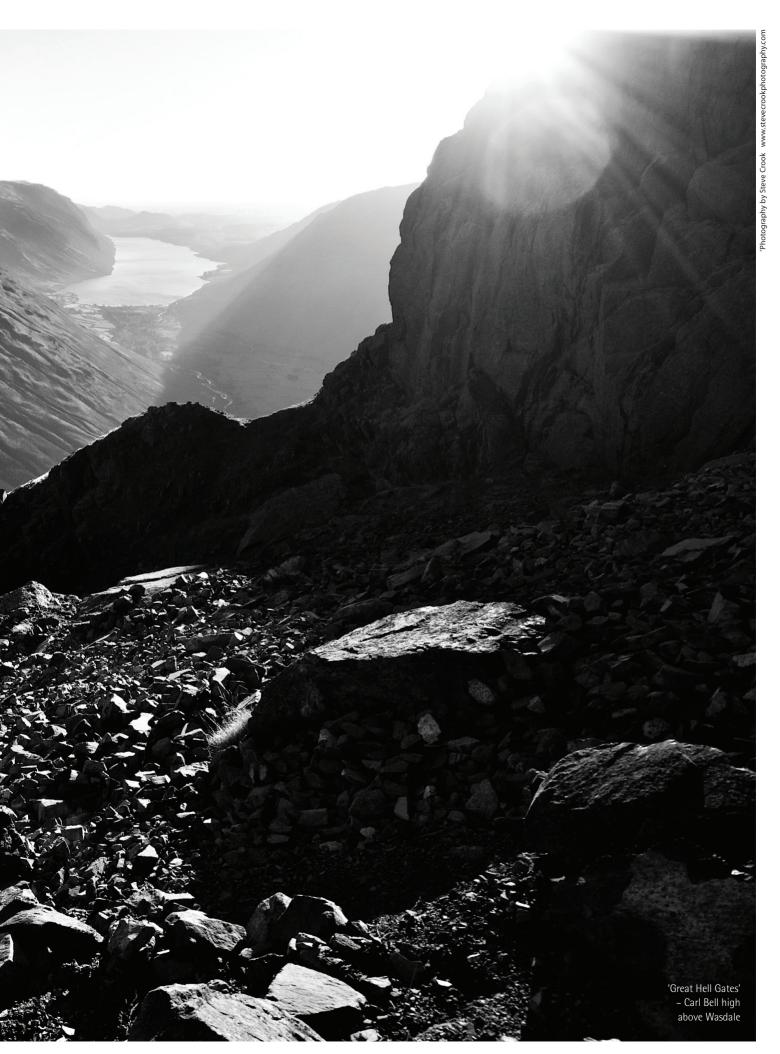

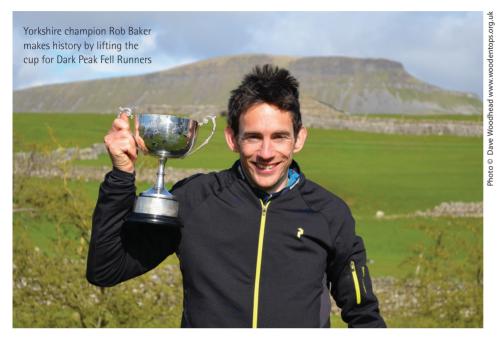

### Yorkshire Corner

### The 58th Three Peaks fell race, incorporating the 35th Senior Yorkshire Fell Championships





#### YORKSHIRE AT ITS FINEST

There cannot be a better venue in Britain than being surrounded by the most famous peaks of Pen Y Ghent, Whernside and Ingleborough and that was the setting for the 35th Senior Fell Championships. The 58th Three Peaks fell race dawned grey and threatening, but once underway it was a grand day, except for the gale force winds, which never seemed to be on the runners back. 34 year old Rob Baker in finishing third made history by becoming the first Dark Peak Fell Runner athlete to win the Tyke championship, many have picked up the silver medal, John Blair-Fish (1983), Ray Aucott (1984) and Andy Harmer (1990). Rob, with backing from John Roche and Oli Johnson, led the Dark Peak club to only its second ever championship team win, the other being in 1990 when Andy Harmer, Bob Berzins and Ed Hutt won at the Holme Moss race. 2010 champion Karl Gray collected the silver medal again like in 2009 and 2007. Former Three Peaks winner and Yorkshire champion, Rob Jebb, picked up the bronze medal.

The winner of the race outright was 28 year old Joe Symonds from Scotland, who emulated his dad Hugh, who won the race in 1984. Joe will have to win the event three more times however to get the better of dad, because he also won in 1985 & 1987. In fact Hugh could have won the Yorkshire championship if he had wanted to, as he was born in the old county boundary when Sedbergh was in Yorkshire.

In the ladies race Helen Berry lifted the perpetual trophy which was donated years ago by her dad 'Storming' Norman which made it an even more significant win. Being champion

means she was automatically selected to compete in the UKA Fell Inter Counties. Helen had previously won the silver medal in 2010 at the Holme Moss event. Helen, a 'life time ago' as an under 18, won the championship in 1989, 1991 and 1992, and then as a junior intermediate, won the English championship in 1993 and 1994. 2010 champion Alison Raw won the silver and Jann Smith collected the bronze. Jann led Ilkley Harriers to team gold medals with Alison Weston and Diane Haggar. Alison was also a gold medallist when Ilkley won the team title in 2002, and with a team victory in 2005 this has

now made it a hat trick of wins for the club.

The famous Scottish club Hunters Bog Trotters provided the ladies winner outright in 25 year old Sarah O'Neill, with Swedish biology student Emelie Forsbery, who was running in the colours of Team Soloman International, finishing second.

paced it well, felt really strong up Whernside (a first!) and once I'd got to Hill Inn, realised that I was on for beating my previous time, which I did by seven minutes, and finished fifth lady. I feel truly honoured to have won the Yorkshire title, and in such an epic race, and to have my name added to the trophy alongside some of the greats...it's like the who's who of English female fell running. Yorkshire is and always has been such a strong county. It seems very fitting that it is the Norman Berry trophy too! The icing on the cake was the automatic selection for the Inter Counties – a team place was something I'd been aiming for this year.

I started running as a child and had grown up spending weekends 'following' my parents in races; mum Hilary in road marathons and dad Norman on the fells. I'm sure that my brother, sister and I sometimes felt that we were dragged along, but I have fond memories of hanging out of the car window cheering on mum (pre seat belt laws, clearly!) and having a picnic on a fell side somewhere whilst dad ran. The tables have turned and I am lucky to have great support from my parents when I'm racing. Having taken part in several cross country races at school, dad suggested I might like to go down to the Harriers at Holmfirth. That was 25 years ago and I haven't looked back. The club was quite different then and I was one of only about half a dozen juniors and even fewer females, that included John Taylor, Will Styan, Simon Brophy and Sally Haigh. Between us all we won English Fell Championship titles: me as a Junior in 1989, 1991 and 1992 and as an Intermediate in 1993 and 1994. I seem to recall we won the English junior team prize one year, as a mixed team. I gained my England vest in 1992; for the inaugural Junior Women's race at the World Cup in Susa. I had been out to three or four World Cups on the 'FRA bus' before that, which was always great fun, but there was no doubt that being part of the England team was very memorable.

I had a slight lull in my racing at university. The running club members seemed more interested in discussing lactic acid after training than having a beer. I didn't even know what lactic acid was at the time! My dad once commented that I was on more pints than miles, but I soon got back into regular training and racing. If one has a genuine love and enjoyment of running, it never wanes.

I've been Ladies' Captain at Holmfirth for many years now and feel very loyal to the club, even though I've lived in Nottingham for 14 years. I still imagine that I'll settle in Yorkshire one day (when I grow up!), but it's only an hour or so up the motorway in order for me to get my fix of the hills and fells. My job in IT sales allows me to plan my own diary, so I try to schedule client meetings up north on a Friday or

Monday if I'm racing at the weekend. And when I'm not racing I am spending weekends away socialising with friends or visiting family..... and with three young nieces and a nephew there is never a dull or quiet moment in my life! I look forward to being able to take them to some junior fell races in the future, which my six year old niece is very excited about already!

Living in Nottingham is not really conducive to training for the ascents we encounter when racing on the fells. The most undulation I see is around Wollaton Park, which used to host the Inter Counties Cross Country and as some readers will know, is not very hilly! Otherwise I'm running on the canal or river paths which by nature are as flat as a pancake. I do most of my mid-week training in spinning classes at the gym, which has no doubt benefited my strength and ascending ability, and certainly feels like I've been running up hill for an hour when I've finished! As well as the fells, I race a lot over cross country during the winter, and have run for the Yorkshire women's cross country team several times. I've enjoyed competing in the English Fell Championship over the last few years and this year hope to continue to improve on my previous positions.



### Just seems unbelievable to me

#### BY YORKSHIRE CHAMPION ROB BAKER OF DARK PEAK FELL RUNNERS

The 3 Peaks race has been my main focus for the Spring and I was pleased with how my training had gone in the build up to the race. I had no real expectations before the competition, but my priority was to run to my own limits and all the advice I had received was that the race does not really start until the ascent of Ingleborough. Whilst I was around people most of the way, I ran very much my own race, and couldn't quite believe that I found myself in second place at the top of the last climb. Carl Bell immediately passed me on the descent and got a 50m lead which pretty much stayed in place for the whole way to the finish. I was trying desperately to catch him and I think he was running scared of being caught. I was thrilled with my time and podium position, and my result was made all the more sweeter to find out that I had also won the Yorkshire champs. I found the whole race a fantastic experience, with great competitors support and atmosphere - I can understand why it has developed such a classic status. It is a great honour to win the Yorkshire Champs, and I am so proud to be the first person to do so wearing the famous brown, yellow and purple colours of the Dark Peak club, which just seems unbelievable to me.

I am an Essex boy by birth, but gravitated north after University and have lived in Yorkshire for over 12 years. At School I was involved in cross country and other activities, but our family got hooked on orienteering at the age of 10 - so my sporting background has been very much rooted in orienteering and I have been fortunate enough to represent Great Britain internationally both as a junior and a senior.

Whilst the running in Essex could not be described as hilly, there were enough bumps and undulations in the area for me to realise that I enjoyed running up and down much more than on the flat. I ran and orienteered enthusiastically until about 16 when other attractions took hold... and then picked it up again at University in Loughborough.

Post University after a year spent travelling and having fun, I made the move to Sheffield in pursuit of good running terrain and friends to enjoy it with. There is a close affiliation between Dark Peak Fell Runners and Sheffield based orienteers and I have always enjoyed running in the local fell races and competing for Dark Peak in the big relays when I was running well enough to get picked for the team.

Over the last 3 years or so I have been seeking out new running challenges, so have tried my hand at marathons and spending more time in the hills and on the fells. In 2012, I am keen to try and tick off some classic fell races and complete an English champs season. This has previously proved almost impossible as there is quite a bit of overlap between the orienteering and fell running seasons. There is an added aim this year of trying to win the English champs team competition for Dark Peak and prove that the



FRA champs result in 2011 was no fluke. I am now really excited to be racing for Yorkshire at the inter-counties. Whilst I have run the Shinning Tor race a few times before, I have never represented a county in fell running so am looking forward to wearing blue and white in the hunt for team glory. Here's hoping.....

### **Fell Inter Counties**

### Yorkshire just love gold

Commonwealth Mountain Running champion & North XC champion, Lizzie Adams, celebrated her 26th birthday in fine style at the UKA Inter Counties Fell Championships in Derbyshire with an individual gold, which was the sixth time Yorkshire have taken the title in the ladies. But the celebrations just carried on with the Tyke girls finishing with all four members of the team in the top ten, which easily won team gold medals for the eighth time. Lizzie last ran in these championships in 2009 when she finished fourth, but no one could live with her pace at the Shining Tor race, as Sarah McCormack of Scotland East and twice Inters winner Olivia Walwyn Bush finished in silver and bronze places. Recent winner of the Wray Caton Moor race Katie Walshaw finished fourth and wearing crisp new vests, both Helen Fines and Yorkshire Champion Helen Berry rounded up the team in seventh and eighth places. Helen Fines had a very late call up and considering she had in the last seven days finished second in the British champs at Slieve Bearnagh and won the Blackstone Edge race, both rough, tough events, this gives an indication of how recilliant she is!

In the mens race, Greater Manchester did it again to us, providing the individual winner for the fifth time in the shape of Northern XC champion Steve Vernon and winning the team gold medals for the seventh time. Chris Smith of Middlesex collected the silver medal like last year and two times Inters winner Andi Jones of Greater Manchester had to settle for the bronze. Yorkshire champion Rob Baker was close behind in fourth, Tom Adams mixed it well to come seventh, Karl Gray came 13th and Graham Pearce 19th, which meant Yorkshire collected silver medals yet again.

The Tyke Juniors dominated the first ever Inter Junior champs, with team golds in BU16, GU16 and BU18 with silver medals in the GU18 where great rivals Lancashire won. In the U16 race, 2011

English champ James Hall and Lewis Byram ran away with the gold and silver medals leaving Iolo Hughes of North Wales with the bronze. Max Wharton, the other Yorkshire runner in his words finished a 'disappointing sixth', especially since he had the previous week won the Yorkshire T&F 1500m title. He did courageously run, despite being doubled up with pain for most of the race with stomach cramp. In the girls, Annabel Mason, the London Mini Marathon winner, along with Yorkshire XC champion, Bronwen Owen, just ran away with the gold and silver medals leaving Lancashire 1500m T&F champion Mary Hodgson with the bronze. Yorkshires newest young recruit and future star Molly Traviss finished in a creditable fifth. Bronwen, the Northern XC champion, over the previous weekends had won the Yorkshire 1500m T&F title and before that was running in the new London Olympic Stadium, competing in the UK Schools T&F Games where she finished with a bronze from the 3000m. James Hall, also experienced the Games venue and was so inspired in the 3000m that he set a new pb by 15 seconds in finishing fifth. James, Annabel and Bronwen showed such speed that they all ran faster than their U18 counterparts who ran the same race route later that day.

Tyke lads Brad Traviss and Tom Saville never gave up chasing home Nathan Jones of North Wales in the BU18 race to collect silver and bronze medals, whilst Richard Powell achieved one of his many ambitions to wear the proud white rose vest to finish eighth. In her first fell race of the year, U18 Yorkshire champion Charlotte Edge, just could not catch race winner Sarah Hodgson, the Lancashire 3000m champion. Florence Haines a recent senior winner of the Cribyn race and Zara Knappy, both wearing the famous blue and white vest for the first time had a real tussle between them to place fifth and sixth. Lancashire Fell & 2000m steeplechase champion, Helena Leathley

# Martin Stone's Long Distance News Summary

### **JULY 2012**

### STEPHEN PYKE - TRANTER'S ROUND RECORD

On 3rd June, Steve set off at 06:32 on a solo/unsupported clockwise circuit of Philip Tranter's round. He was carrying a four pack of hot cross buns, a malt loaf and a bag of jelly babies in his rucsack. He climbed Ben Nevis, crossed the Lochaber 4000's and then the Grey Corries before dropping in to Abhain Rath in 5hrs 29min. He then climbed onto Sgurr Eilde Mhor and traversed the length of the Mamores in 6hrs 48mins, returning to Glen Nevis in the excellent time of 12hrs 17mins. This reduced Mark McDermott's solo/unsupported record set in 1990 by a very significant margin of 33 minutes. The weather was a bit cloudy and it was a chilly wind for June but visibility was good and it stayed dry. He bumped into lan Charters coming off Binnein Mor.

In 2007, Steve set the Scottish 4000s record for the 83mile/17,000ft run from Glen Nevis to Glenmore in 20hrs 23 and in 2010 he blazed a trail round all the Scottish Munros as a continuous human powered journey in 39 days nine hours and six minutes

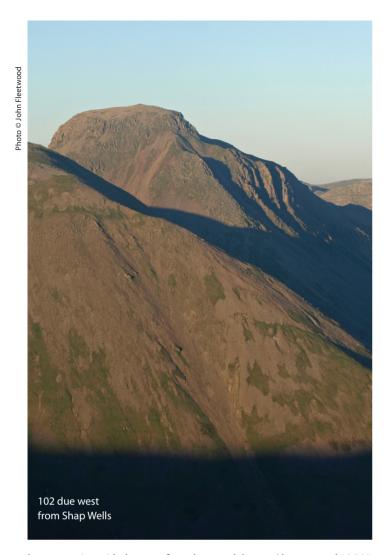
Tranter's Round was an excellent "training run" for Steve as he will be

making a second attempt on the 24 hour Munro Record on 30th June weather permitting. He will be trying to extend Jon Broxap's outstanding 1988 record of 28 Munros in the Cluanie/Glen Shiel area. By the time you read this, we will know the outcome and by then, Steve may hold most of the major Scottish Mountain Endurance records. Best of luck to Spyke.

### **JOHN FLEETWOOD - 102 WEST &** FISHERFIELD ROUND REVISITED

After a quiet period, John has brought me up-to-date with news of his latest ultra distance challenges. In late May, he tried something different following Northing 102 due west from Shap Wells to a point near Egremont, never deviating more than 200m from the straight line and trying to keep as close to the line as possible. This line is the most continuous John could see in the Lakes without having to swim through a lake or traverse a vegetated cliff. He made a small exception near Grasmere to avoid a lot of trespassing and wall climbing but the detour was small. It turned out to





be very testing with the sort of rough ground that you'd expect and 19,500 feet ascent in less than 40 miles. To add a bit of extra spice, when John arrived at Egremont, he had to make his own way back to the Old Dungeon Gill in Langdale! Just ten days later on the 9th June, he completed a 24 hour (shorter) version of the 31 hour Fisherfield Round that he had first established in 2011. This is a magnificent 60 mile round with 25,500ft ascent from Dundonell that crosses the Fannaichs, Fisherfield, An Teallach and Beinn Dearg. John feels that this route is one of his favourite challenges and the requirement to traverse all the pinnacles on An Teallach adds a bit of spice, especially if left until the end! #### YIANNIS TRIDIMAS – 13 CORBETTS

In June 2011 Yiannis established a round of 12 Corbetts which form a natural circuit around Glen Lyon. On that occasion he had to leave the 13th Corbett in order to complete his round within 24 hours. On 1st/2ndMay 2012 he repeated the journey and managed to include the 13th Corbett. He completed the round solo and the route of 96km/6000M ascent took him 22hours 42 minutes. Yiannis feels this should be a challenge to tempt the purist as there are just 13 hills to be climbed and no others. The area lends itself to the challenge being attempted either solo or with full support, with only a small amount of driving required. Yiannis rates this as one of the best rounds he has ever done and you can read all about it in a full article elsewhere in the magazine.

### TOM GIBBS - CUMBRIAN TRAVERSE RECORD

As build up to a BG attempt at the end of June, Tom made a solo/unsupported attempt at the Cumbrian Traverse on Sunday 6th May. The route is 30 miles with 11,000ft of ascent and Tom was attempting it to celebrate his 40th birthday the day. He was spurred on by a "cruel" hoax perpetrated by Lou Roberts, who told him that Scoffer had completed the

route the day before in 6 hrs 21 mins. You can read a full article elsewhere about how Tom ran himself ragged but by bizarre coincidence equalled the non-existent record. He actually broke Mike Robinson's real record set in Winter by 1hr 45 minutes.

#### TOM PHILLIPS – 3 ROUNDS IN A YEAR

After completing a Bob Graham Round in Winter on Feb 7th 2011 and a Ramsay Round on June 19th 2011, the opportunity to do the "triple in one season" was too good to miss. He went on to complete the Paddy Buckley Round on 19th July. This feat has only been completed by three people - Adrian Belton and Helen Diamantides in 1989, Jon Chapman in 2008. However Mike Hartley did incredibly complete all three consecutively in 1990 finishing with a 33 hour Paddy Buckley Round.

Each round took Tom about 23 hours and as all have quite different difficulties to overcome, he feels they are hard to compare. BG in summer (which he also completed in 2010) is certainly the easiest of the three rounds, but the PBR and Ramsay are pretty close in difficulty. There are lots of big climbs and rocky terrain on the Ramsay Round, whilst the Paddy Buckley Round is very rough underfoot compared to the Bob Graham.

### The Cumbrian Traverse

### -A Lakeland Odyssey

The Gofar website is a dangerous place to go, especially on dark winter nights or when you move to an area like the Lake District. It sparks the imagination and is too tempting by half. This was how I stumbled across the Cumbrian Traverse Route, it looked great - a 30 mile, 11000ft of ascent linear route cutting a swathe across the heart of the Lakes and taking in a lot of my favourite fells (Old Man, Bowfell, Gable,

Turning 40 in early May, I had originally planned on a Bob Graham Round as a Birthday present to myself (that just sounds all wrong), but timings meant that the BG will have to happen later this summer (look out for a write up later this year!) and the Cumbrian Traverse seemed to fit the bill - great BG training, quality route and I could still have a few beers on my Birthday!

Only debate was South to North or North to South. Avoiding the Bank Holiday tourists in Keswick and the slow drive back through central Lakeland coupled with ascending Great End from Sty Head quickly answered this for me.

So the plan was to do a solo and unsupported North – South attempt on Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> May. From speaking to Steve Birkenshaw, seemed like around 7hrs would be possible and inside the current record (according to Gofar 8:06 by Mike Robinson in winter!).

On the Friday, my wife Astrid (currently injured but a bargain at 1 pint in the fantasy fell-running!) found out from Lou Roberts that Scoffer was planning an attempt on the

Contacting Lou Saturday evening to see how he got on, she told me he did 6hrs 21mins. I think my response was Wow that's fast - it equates to Billy Bland BG pace.

I quickly looked at my overly complicated spreadsheet and tried to draw up a schedule for 6hrs 15mins - it looked daunting and damn quick, but I reasoned that I'd see how it goes and if I was close come the Coniston Fells then I'd

So I set off by myself on Sunday morning at a little after 9:30, weather was looking a little threatening, but no wind.

After the long road/path section it was good to be up onto the climb of Cat Bells. Here it started hailing, but with such a light wind it just bounced off harmlessly. It soon turned to Snow up on Maiden Moor, but despite that it was great for running and by Honister I was nearly 10 minutes up on the Schedule, getting there in 90mins – wow, maybe I can do this I thought. By the time I got to Brandreth the cloud started to lift and the snow stopped, giving a fantastic view of the North Face of Great Gable, which looked

stunning with a dusting of snow. By the summit of Gable I was 10 minutes ahead of schedule and thoroughly enjoying the route, though the leg over to Great End looked a long way.

After the rocky blocky descent to Sty Head the climb up Great End was a new one to me, really nice and away from the masses. However it took me slightly longer than planned, about 37mins Gable to End and by the time I'd crossed Esk Pike and Bowfell I was only a few minutes up. Here I got my first glimpse of the rest of the route and it looked a mighty long way, though according to the schedule I was half way.

Crinkle Crags proved to be crucial as not being sure of the racing line I took in too many Crinkles and from the top, descended the scramble, rather than easier lines. All my schedule advantage had been lost.

The route across to Cold Fell heralded a change in terrain and popularity; here the going was fast and the tourists missing. I didn't take the best of lines, but was soon charging down to the top of Wrynose. Here I bumped into Lou going for a walk with her dog. Not time to stop I shouted a quick hello.

As I crossed Wrynose I'd been going just over 4 hours and was a few minutes down on schedule, realising that I could do this I picked up the pace and had a solid climb up Great Carrs, managing to run a good portion of the ascent. Then I was back on local fells, favourites such as Swirl How, Old Man and Dow Crag were bagged and it wasn't long before I was descending to the top of the Walna Scar. In front lay some unknown territory, I'd done the Caw race and walked up a couple of the Stickles, but didn't really know the route so navigation was order of the day.

This section was probably one of the nicest as well, with a cracking descent off White Maiden, brilliant views, classic Lakeland running and hardly anyone in sight.

Soon I was on Caw and surprisingly still on schedule. However things started to slip a bit due to me underestimating the distance to Stickle Pike. Suddenly I'd dropped 3 or 4 minutes behind schedule, and by

The time I summited the last top, Great Stickle I had about 8 minutes to break Scoffers time. Suddenly I was in short fell race mode, this close and I was determined to do it, I crossed the bridge with a minute to go and was desperately hoping to see the hall, the 200m to the pub sign appear and then suddenly the hall was there. I looked at my watch and it ticked over to 6hrs 21 mins literally 5 yards from the Hall. By the time I'd stopped it I'd completed the rout e in 6hrs 21 mins and 3 seconds!!

I couldn't believe after all that way I'd done exactly the same time, you couldn't have planned it. So close, but no shame in equalling a superb effort by Scoffer, and in many ways more fitting.

Staggering up to the Blacksmiths Arms I met up with Astrid and a friend, they were as stunned as me that I had equalled the time.

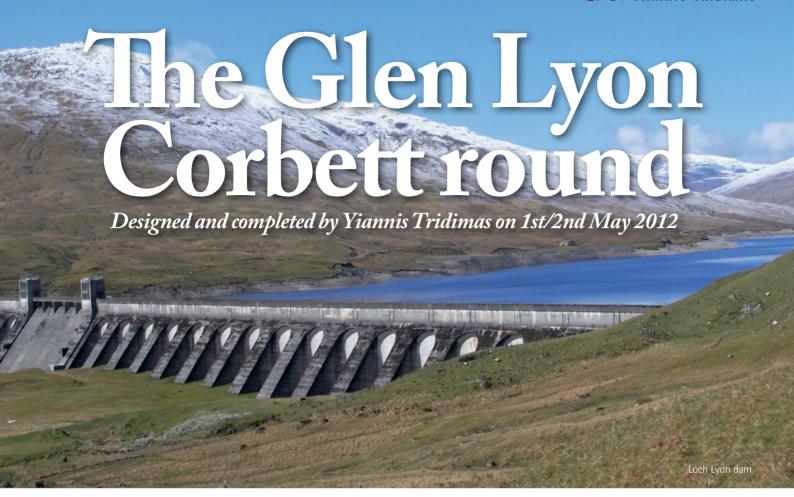
Sitting with a drink (and very sore legs) I reflected on what was probably the best route I have ever done in the Lakes - something special about linear routes and this one covers all types of Lakeland terrain from paths to Rock, Scree to

However this is not the end of the story, the real surprise was to come when we contacted Lou to tell her that I had equalled Scoffers time only for Lou to gleefully tell us that Scoffer's time was a hoax! He had not done the route; they had made it up the previous evening as a wind up. It had certainly wound me up, pushing very hard to beat a time that didn't exist. Though I'd like to thank them because I wouldn't of thought to do the route that quickly, especially unsupported and it's reinforced that it's amazing what you can do when you try.

Just a shame that Billy's BG time isn't a hoax!

"Glen Lyon is little known, and less visited, and it is only when you seek it out on a map that you begin to realise just how significant a presence it is in the central Highlands. The glen extends for some 25 miles from the pretty village of Fortingall in the east to the head of Loch Lyon in the west". This eloquent introduction to Glen Lyon is given in Undiscovered Scotland together with a plethora of useful information about access and facilities in this beautiful part of Scotland.

### **Background information**

Corbetts are hills between 2500ft and 3000ft with a re-ascent of 500ft on all sides. There are 221 Corbetts in Scotland. "The re-ascent rule ensures that they are well-defined and fairly detached summits, in contrast to the Munros, where there is no obvious criterion for deciding on separate Munros" (Andrew Dempster, the Munro Phenomenon, 1995). "Where you can often climb three or four, or on one occasion seven Munros in one single walk, there are few Corbett groups where you can climb more than two or three on a single walk" (Cameron McNeish, the Corbett Almanac, 1999). "By their very nature, Corbetts rarely form themselves into self-contained and manageable groups" (Andrew Dempster, the Munro Phenomenon, 1995). There are very few clusters of Corbetts that can be tackled in a single 24-hour challenge. Those areas are Ardgour, the area around Loch Arkaig and that around Loch Lyon.

In June 2011 I completed a challenge of 12 out of the 13 Corbetts that form a cluster around Glen Lyon starting and finishing at Tyndrum, details in the summer 2011 Fellrunner. It was

my first visit to the area and although I enjoyed navigating my way round in mixed weather conditions, I had to leave out one of the Corbetts in the group so as to complete the circuit in under 24 hours. I resolved then that I would revisit the area and attempt to include all 13 hills so as to produce a definitive Corbett round. In order to improve the route design, I moved the start/finish to Glen Lyon. This produced a more compact circuit, all of it lying in some beautiful and remote country, away from centres of population.

### The Glen Lyon Corbett Round

I travelled to Scotland on May 1st and arrived at my destination in mid-afternoon. After a brief rest I sorted out the food deposit near the Loch an Daimh dam and drove the short distance to Stronuich reservoir and made a start at around 6:30pm. The weather was as predicted, settled with clear skies and a cool breeze.

The first hill, Beinn nan Oighreag, is the highest of the 13 Corbetts and has two cairns a short distance apart with a shallow dip in between them. Although the OS map shows the smaller SW cairn on top of a large rock as the summit, I visited them both as they looked to be about the same height (Great End in Cumbria has also got two cairns, the smaller SE cairn is the OS summit, the larger NW is the Harvey summit).

I made swift progress over the second hill and following a rough track along Gleann Da Eig I arrived at the quiet hamlet of Camusvrahan just as it was getting dark, which provided me with some cover for a bit of trespassing by climbing over a couple of gates, going through a field and through a rough wood to gain a forest track that went part way up the longest climb of the round to Beinn Dearg.

It was a clear night with a three quarter moon shining overhead. As I was climbing with my torch off, deer were silhouetted against the illuminated sky, watching me for a while and then disappearing in the darkness. This helped pass the time and soon I reached the top. The large expanse from there to the next forest track is one of the rougher areas with a fair amount of peat and heather. There I made use of the torch and for the only time, my compass, in order to maintain a straight line towards the forest gate, more than a mile away. I normally dislike tracks but the track that goes down the forest and winds its way up Cam Chreag is one I do like. The eastern flanks of Cam Chreag are covered with thick heather and without the track the going would be hard and slow.

I quickly descended the grassy and slightly boggy hillside to my food stash. There I sat for over 15 minutes consuming a whole flask of hot noodle and leek soup and picking up more supplies to last me to the end. The sky was now getting cloudy and as the moon was moving west, darkness was setting in while I was running along Loch an Daimh. A very steep climb at the end of the loch was over and twilight was making things easier now. Over the next hill and down to Loch Lyon and along the long track, which, although not shown on the map, goes all the way round the loch. The long climb on soft grass to Beinn nam Fuaran was being made harder by the warm sunshine. Down the very steep SW side to the bealach and a relatively



easy climb to Beinn a Chaisteil, the hill I had left out in my first visit.

Although a bit tired by now I enjoyed the good grassy descent to Glen Coralan, while surveying the line of ascent of Beinn Odhar. I opted for the NE ridge where there was a fair amount of rock in order to avoid the springy grass. At this easternmost point the route turns for 'home'. I had made very good time thus far and was happy with my performance. The next couple of hills are quite close but the last but one, Beinn nan Imirean, is particularly steep. That over, I got down to the long track, not all of it shown on OS maps. In this short foray into Glen Lochay I felt the heat of the sun more than before. The cool wind had dropped and it was seriously hot. But I kept pushing on and looking forward to getting Meall nan Subh out of the way. This is an odd hill, with many knolls and little valleys between them, a real nightmare in bad visibility. In my first visit in 2011 it was just

like that and I thanked my gps which pointed me to the summit cairn. I would not like to have to find it in an event like that using map and compass! After a telephone call home (no signal in the Glen) I negotiated the descent down the craggy eastern side and made my way to where I had started from 22 hours and 42 minutes before, still in good condition although tired and thirsty as the water in the streams in the closing sections was peaty and not very tasty.

Unlike other 24-hour challenges, the Corbett round only takes in Corbetts and no other hill, large or small. The area is mainly grassy with some small stretches of heather, peat and tussocks. Soft grass is great for descending but makes climbing hard. Most of the ascents are steep and long. The average climb per hill is over 1500ft, varying between 800ft and 2000ft plus.

Some of the Corbetts are adjacent to one another, separated by deep bealachs and others are a long distance apart. The 13 hills are

almost completely pathless but around a third of the overall distance is on rough tracks and lanes along the Glens and the Lochs. Transition between Corbetts along high level routes is not a practical option.

The challenge can easily be supported at a number of points along the route with very little driving involved and the support team would have a great time enjoying the beauty of the Glen and refreshing themselves at the cafe/shop near the river by the Bridge of Balgie.

If the question is: Why a round of Corbetts? My answer is: Why not! The 13 Corbetts present almost as much of a challenge to the fellrunner as the 23 (24 initially) Munros of the Ramsay round; there are no easy climbs in between to lessen the toil and everyone of the 13 Corbetts is as intimidating as Yewbarrow, some even more so.

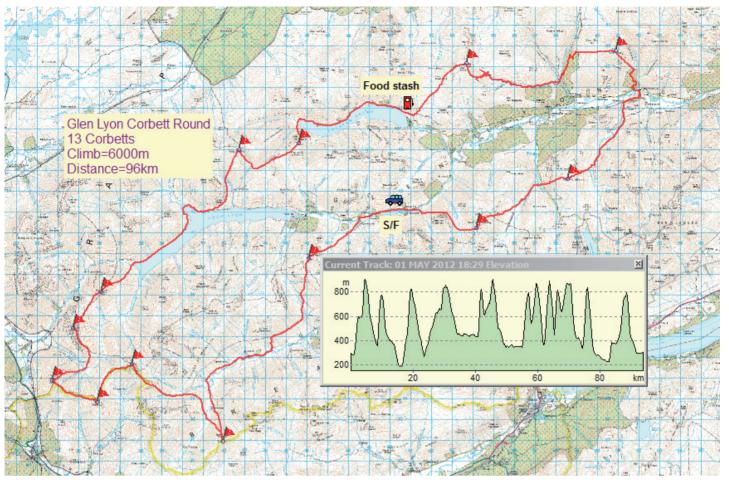


Above: Poster at Glen Lyon. Below: View from the cafe at the Bridge of Balgie

### WADSWORTHTROG West Yorkshire BL/32.2km/1220m 11.02.12

However, what I'd thought might be the end of the worst of the ice proved to be worse than before, and it was here that I slid somewhat despondently into forumite Bob the Dog. Or did he slide into me? Clearly, unless we found a way around this section, there was no race, not even a shortened bad weather version of it. Happily, a route was found, and even more happily BtD offered to flag it for me so I could get on with other pre-race things, such as picking up the one-off T-shirts made to mark 25 years of Calder Valley Fell Runners.

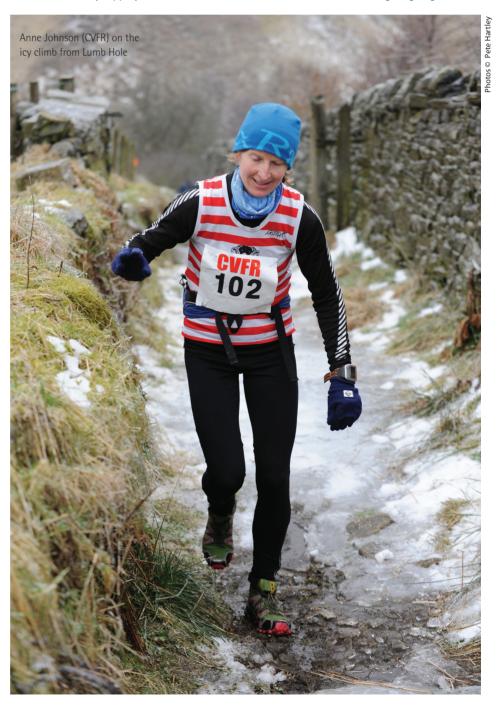
Word came back from the rest of the course that, while certainly slippery, there were safe

routes through and round the ice so with stern warning of the extreme conditions issued on the forum, the race was on.

There was no change in the conditions underfoot come race day, however the improved visibility promised a stunning if slow and slippery day out on the moors in perhaps unique conditions.

There was hot competition in the women's race, with Nicky Spinks, Aly Raw, Anne Johnson and last year's second place woman, Helen Jackson, as potential first place finishers. On the day, Spinks proved her mettle to take first place by nearly 5 minutes. The men's competition was slightly less fierce after Carl Bell had to call off running having picked up an injury through the week. This left James Logue leading the way, eventually shaking off Jon Wright and Jon Morgan to finish ten minutes clear of Wright. Apart from a few shin scratches, Logue appeared unaffected by the icy conditions, and Wright was left apparently with plenty of energy to spare as he rushed off to work.

Others found the race tougher going.



Twelve did not finish, two having decided that the conditions weren't for them by the first checkpoint, and a further six dropping out further round the course. Unfortunately there was one nasty sprained ankle, right at the most remote part of the course.

Competitors showed fell running its best light, as Jonny Watson, Pete Fitzpatrick and Bob the Dog (at the heart of the action again!) gave up their race to help the injured runner off the moors, while others ran on to raise the alert and offered up bandages and painkillers. While there were plenty of other falls and scrapes along the way, finishers seemed to agree it was a great day out and were glad of the chance to test themselves in such challenging but beautiful conditions. For my part, I was heartened to see the responsible attitude that everyone took on the day and hope the day goes a little way to countering some of the 'health and safety gone mad' and 'fell running goes soft' discussion that appears from time to time on the forum.

Finally, I don't think I can finish the race report without letting everyone know of the essential new piece of kit invented by Leanne Hague of Abbey Runners: the modesty jacket. A fall left her with her leggings in tatters, and a moonie that Bart Simpson would be proud of. The added ventilation proved no problems however, and with her jacket round her waist she made it back to the finish in time to help her team to first place, just one point ahead of Todmorden Harriers.

Thanks to everyone who took part for taking care, to those who didn't take part for taking extra care, to the marshals for remaining cheerful, and to Active Human for providing prizes for first man and woman.

See you all next year, hopefully in slightly warmer conditions.

### BLACK COMBE Cumbria AM/13km/1000m 03.03.12

The Black Combe Fell Race, which covers 8.2 miles with a lofty 3280ft ascent, from Silecroft, was the first tester for many of the country's leading fellsmen and women as they aim to get themselves fully fit for the major races and national championship events during 2012.

The 203 runners who toed the line for the noon start had to visit Seaness, Black Combe, White Combe, and then the sting in the tail: from a checkpoint at a stream at the base of the Combe, everyone had to climb back up Black Combe to visit the last checkpoint at south summit before the fast downhill back to the finish next to Kirkbank fell gate, near the trackroad start which, thus, was altered this year avoiding the farmer's land and this may become the new start and finish in future years, shortening the race to 7.9 miles.

There was a prize also up for grabs for the fastest descent from CP6 S summit to the finish, this going to Howgill AC's Carl Bell, who clocked an exceptional 7 minutes 24 seconds for the 1.8 mile downhill, with Angela Armstrong, Keswick AC, two minutes adrift the quickest female descender.

The weather was fair. Clearish skies and good visibility below the Combe summit made

for some good times, but neither the male or female records went. A lot of runners suffered the heavy hail shower that occurred whilst between CP2 and 3.

Fastest, but just outside the course record, was Staveley based Bingley Harrier, Rob Jebb, in a very speedy 67:15. Carl Bell returned for second place in 68:47, just pipping Borrowdale Fell Runners' Chris Steele, who was well happy with his third place in 68:51. Chris's clubmate, Steve Birkinshaw, took the first MV40 prize arriving in 73:10.

First MV50 went to Mick Stenton from Dark Peak AC in 75:37, whilst Mick's teammate, Dave Tait, picked up the first MV60 prize in 97:51.

The lady victor was Hazel Robinson from Ambleside AC clocking a pleasing 89:48. Second lady went to Angela Armstrong in 95:45, just edging out the third female, Wendy Dodds of Clayton-le-Moors AC, in 98:03, but this is a remarkable time from the queen of the fells as she was also first LV60!, beating the first LV50 and LV40 runners Kim Brazwell, Mercia Fell Runners, and Alison Weston, Ilkley Harriers, respectively, both outside 100 minutes.

Men's team prize went to Borrowdale, whilst ladies' team prize went to Ambleside.

Speaking of prizes, this year there'll be an additional prize awarded to the quickest male and female taking part in all four of BCRs organized fell races of which there's Caw (23 May), Dunnerdale (10 Nov) and Kirkby Moor (24 Nov) still to come, and the best aggregate score for all four races on time taken.

Special thanks goes to all who helped organise the event, for which without this the race would not have been possible. Some good comments have also been posted on the club's and FRA website forums from runners at the race thanking the helpers and marshals for a good well organised race, food after and the day in general.

## CAUSEY PIKE FELL RACE Cumbria AS/7.2km/543m 31.03.12

After many years under the stewardship of Lyn Thompson, there were new organisers for the Causey Pike fell race with Dan Barton and John Nicoll taking on responsibility from 2012. It was to prove an eventful debut for the new organisers with a number of race records being broken.

The first of these was a record turnout with 171 competitors finishing the testing fell race. This is testament to the growing popularity of this early season race and with the fine March weather continuing over the weekend there was little surprise at the large number on the start line.

The race starts from the small village of Stair in the Newlands Valley. There is a short section of road as the runners leave the village but the fell race quickly starts in earnest with the lungbusting ascent of Rowling End. This is a fierce climb with little choice of route but once the initial ascent is out of the way there is a short period of relief as the ridge levels out and the participants can resume a running pace. This is short lived, however, as Sleet Hause is reached and the runners have to face another tough climb, rockier than the first, to the prominent summit of Causey Pike. The descent is equally challenging with a fast and furious drop off of the fell-side before a fast finish along the mine road which runs parallel with Stonycroft Gill and hack to the finish in Stair

Rob Jebb led the race from the start and took both the race win and the newly introduced first to the summit prize. Rob's winning time was 33:10 which meant the course record set by Borrowdale's Simon Booth (32:14 in 1998) remained in place for another year. Carl Bell put in a fine descent to claim second place in 33:50 with youngster, Tom Addison, third. There was a Borrowdale one-two in the over 40 category with Simon Booth fourth in 34:18 and Mike Fanning fifth in 34:40.

So the existing men's record remained in place but this was not the case for the female record as Lizzie Adams put in a storming run to finish first lady in 37:33, shaving nearly a minute off the previous best time. This was set by Pippa Maddams and Pippa had another strong run this year with a second placed finish, crossing the line in 39:05. Third was Hazel Robinson and first veteran was Jackie Casey.

There was a convivial atmosphere in the village hall after the race as the runners were able to refresh themselves with the abundant amount of tea and cake on offer. There was also a generous array of prizes, provided by sponsors EDZ technical clothing of Keswick, and a great deal of credit must go to John and Dan as all those taking part seemed to have enjoyed the race. Everyone's favourite fell runner and Mr Bunny, lan Holmes, once again proved the master of the course by winning for the 31st time, showing that a few injury niggles will never stop him from displaying his prowess at these races, as he was the only one to break sixteen minutes on the windy showery night, in a field of 301.

The youngsters were allowed to fight out the Egg Stage and U16 Max Wharton the English Uphill champion, had the speed to fend off the English U16 and Yorkshire champion, James Hall. Max looks to be putting his injuries behind him now and finished third behind James so both have now earned Yorkshire selection for the U16 inter Counties in May. U16 course record holder James now looks certain to win the series and become immortalised on next year's Bunny Beer label, if he runs the following week. Seth Waterman won the BU14, Alan Wright the V50 and Steve Carter again the V60. Miss Bunnygirl, Katie Walshaw, is unstoppable at the moment having just won Pendle fell race three days previous in a very fast 35.37 finishing sixteenth overall there, so how she had the speed in her

legs to equal Scary Mary Wilkinson's Egg Stage time of 3.59 is astounding. The 27 year old only faltered towards the end to miss Mary's course record by seven seconds and considering the weather that record is within her grasp as she finished twelfth overall. Former U16 Bunny champ Mel Hyder who finished third at Pendle came second with Jo Buckley third. Elizabeth Greenwood and Molly Traviss dominated the FU14 and FU16 categories again.

This race also celebrated the eighteenth birthday of Rosie Hellawall in true Bunny Run fashion, with an elite number and her having to wear bunny ears and a bob tail. At the prize giving it was a raucous rendition of 'happy birthday'. A multi signed birthday card, flashing bunny ears and an ultimate giant cupcake, before the finale where she helped throw out the crème eggs, sweets, haribos etc. to the eager mad crowd, what a way to spend your birthday! *The Woodentops*

If you've ever sat in the Whinlatter Forest Visitor Centre and gazed in a Southwesterly direction – you see a steep ridge towering above the treetops that leads to a rocky summit. Every year, a classic fell race is held to and from this rocky summit of Grisedale Pike. There's no time for competitors to linger and admire the Lakeland panorama however, as they need to perform a quick about turn to undertake the exhilarating challenge of running down the steep, heathery descent as they head back for the shelter of the forest.

Sixty fell runners ignored the weather forecast of hail and thundery showers and completed this tough challenge in the footsteps of the winner, Martin Mikkelsen-Barron. Martin is no stranger to this race route - indeed he works at Whinlatter and has won the race on three previous occasions. creditable 37th. Barber senior said "Jack ran very well. He is a good all-rounder and enjoying a range of sports while studying in Manchester".

The race marshals endured difficult conditions up on the hill, and the finish funnel team and results compilers battled with fading daylight and increasingly soggy paperwork as the rain intensified through the evening. But their determination resulted in a job well done, and we owe everyone who helped great thanks for their efforts.

In this race we were also trialling a new electronic timing and tracking system. This ran in tandem with the normal manual system. If it works it will improve the safety on long mountain events. It will be used in June on the 1000 Metre Peaks race in North Wales.

One of my intentions was to encourage the older fell runner and to give the same prize for each category. I was surprised by the number of runners on the night. I had expected between 50–70 but 114 left the start line. The response of the local spectators who, for some, had never witnessed the power and speed that top fell runners generate from the start, will stay in my memory. For me the sight of Jack Ross, a young fell runner, winning the race and of Steph Curtis, the winner of the ladies' section, made me proud of what outstanding role models they give to the younger generation.

Thank you marshals, the local community, the land owners of Masson Hill. You made my job easy.

## ANNALONG HORSESHOE Co. Down, Northern Ireland AL/21km/1550m 28.04.12

Deon McNeilly and Ciara Largey were the winners of the second round of the Northern Ireland Mountain Running Championship. It was the 31st running of the classic Annalong Horseshoe and with Championship status there was a record entry of 77 people. The race climbs five major peaks in the Eastern Mournes around the Annalong valley, covering 13 miles with a total ascent of 5,100 feet.

McNeilly is normally a front runner but started off at the rear of the leading pack. As the group approached Long Seefin, traditionally there is a choice of two routes to the first summit. McNeilly watched all the leading contenders choose the same direction, he promptly selected the other route and sprinted off in the direction of the first summit, unseen by the leading contenders. By the time they realised McNeilly's tactics, he was already ahead and through the first checkpoint.

Deon McNeilly's tactics meant that he had opened up a lead of a minute by the first summit, Chimney Rock, and made all the running over the next four peaks to maintain his advantage all the way to the finish. McNeilly may be in his 50th year and may not descend just as fast as he used to but he still retains his awesome climbing ability and comfortably controlled the race from the front. As the chasing pack closed in on the steep descents, McNeilly powered away from the pack on the ascents and maintained his advantage all the way to the finish.

The Newcastle man clocked 2.05.42 to notch up his 4th win in this classic event in impressive style. Johnny Steede and Stephen Cunningham

chased hard throughout to take second and third on 2.06.47 and 2.07.57, with Clive Bailey, Neil Carty and Sam Herron completing the top six.

Ciara Largey was in tremendous form as she knocked almost two minutes off the highly respected women's course record which was set by three times British Master Champion, Fiona Maxwell, five years ago, Ciara seems to be getting faster and faster with each race this season and was nearly 20 minutes faster than her winning time last year. The trainee Doctor clocked 2.26.56 for 10th place overall, a time which represents a quantum leap forward and means she should be capable of being up among the top women in Britain. Defending NI Champion, Shileen O'Kane, was runner up 2.36.38, a time which would have secured a good win in almost any other year, with Anne Sandford third in 2.53.35.

Thanks to Lagan Valley Orienteers for the hire of the Sport Ident timing system, to Northern Ireland Water Service for access to their property for off-street car parking and to the members of organising club BARF for marshalling and post race refreshments.

## THREE PEAKS North Yorkshire AL/37.4km/1608m 28.04.12

A Scottish runner with a growing international reputation beat world class opposition to win the 2012 Three Peaks Race but set himself another tough challenge in the process.

Joe Symonds, 28, finished the 23-mile race over the summits of Penyghent, Whernside and Ingleborough in the Yorkshire Dales in 2.55.58. Now he must win the race, which has Salomon as its principle sponsor, twice more to equal the achievement of his father, Hugh Symonds, of Kendal Athletic Club, who won in 1984, 1985 and 1987.

They are the second father and son to win the Three Peaks Race. Harry Walker, of Blackburn Harriers, won in 1977, 1978 and 1981. His son, David, of Clayton-le-Moors, won in 2003.

Joe Symonds' father was not there to see him beat some of the race favourites, including last year's winner Tom Owens. After finishing the race



at Horton-in-Ribblesdale, near Settle, Symonds was not able to get a mobile phone signal to tell his father of his success. Joe said: "When I contact him he will be quite happy. In fact I think it will make his day." But it later emerged that Hugh Symonds, who was in New Zealand, was monitoring his son's progress via the SPORTIdent website on the Internet and knew he had won. Joe said: "It's nice that they were taking such an interest on the other side of the world."

After several days of heavy rain, race day dawned dry, but there was a bitter cold easterly wind and the temperature barely lifted above three degrees on the summits. The 745 starters from an entry of 1,000 found themselves battling against showers of sleet.

Symonds, who finished ninth in the Three Peaks in 2008 when it incorporated the World Long Distance Mountain Running Challenge and retired at the Hill Inn checkpoint last year suffering from blisters and what he described as "a lack of fitness", was modest about his success.

He said: "The Three Peaks has a reputation for toughness, but in some ways you have to be fortunate to win it. If you have anything wrong with you on the day, you will get found out on this course."

The Three Peaks is billed as "the Marathon with Mountains" because of its 5,270ft of ascent. Symonds, whose wife's parents were on the summit of Ingleborough to support him, added: "I was lucky. I felt I was running really well and I won it. Whether I can come back and do it again, we will have to see."

In the 2011 Gore-Tex Trans-Alpine Run, Symonds and his teammate Jethro Lennox, who won the Three Peaks in 2008, finished only 17 minutes behind the winners, the Spaniards David Lopez and Miguel Caballero. In eight days of trail running, the winners covered 273.73 kilometres and 15,436 metres of ascent in 26.37.51. Symonds and Lennox were second and won the final stage.

In the 2012 Three Peaks Race, second and third places went to two runners making their first attempts. Carl Bell, 29 was second in 2.57.29 and Rob Baker, 34, finished third in 2.58.01.

Fourth was Ricky Lightfoot in 3.00.21. Karl Gray, 42, had a notable race taking the male veteran Over 40 title and fifth place in 3.01.19. His time was a new V40 record over the current course.

Andrew Davies was sixth in 3.02.05. Rob Jebb, who won the Three Peaks in 2005, 2006, 2007 and 2009, finished in seventh place in 3.02.55 ahead of last year's winner, Tom Owens in 3.04.56.

As well as winning the race, Hunters Bog Trotters also supplied the fastest woman competitor. Sarah O'Neil, 25, finished in 3.28.43. O'Neill's time on Penyghent summit was 20 seconds ahead of the second placed female, Emelie Forsberg, of Salomon International, who finished in 3.43.52. Forsberg, a biology student from Tromso in Sweden, who sat an exam the day before the Three Peaks, fell further behind at Ribblehead and O'Neill was 4.38 ahead on Whernside and reached Ingleborough 12 minutes ahead of the newcomer. Third was Welsh international fell runner Sarah Ridgway, 38, in 3.45.51.

In the men's race, the pace was slow to the

summit of Penyghent with Symonds, Baker, Lightfoot, Gray, Davies, Jebb and Owens all taking 30 minutes. Bell took nearly a minute longer but was back in contention at Ribblehead where the first three to finish were all within 22 seconds of each other.

Symonds, who said he enjoyed the steep climb up the face of Whernside, reached the summit 1.49 ahead of Bell, with Baker only two seconds behind. Symonds lost a few seconds on the rough descent to the Hill Inn where he was 1.44 ahead of Lightfoot, with Bell only three seconds slower

Despite the weather, there was a good crowd of supporters on Ingleborough to see Symonds arrive in 2.25.44. Baker followed in 2.28.48 with Bell two seconds behind. Then it was the long run for home through Sulber Nick with Symonds worrying that he might be overtaken, but making it back to Horton with a 1.27 margin.

In her 29th completion of the Three Peaks Race, Wendy Dodds, 61, the joint ladies' winner in 1983, set a new lady Over 60 record. Her time of 4.23.14 was quicker than all the Over 60 men!

Two runners completed the race for the 21st time to qualify for the special award issued by the Three Peaks Race Association. They were Tony Varley, of Horwich, and Jean-Marc Lawton, of Stornoway in the Outer Hebrides, who is in the process of writing a book on the history of the Three Peaks Race.

It was an indication of the difficult conditions that only 641 of the 745 starters finished the race. The race organisers expressed their gratitude to the marshals and radio operators, some of whom endured up to six hours on the summits in poor weather conditions until all the runners were safely at the finish.

Race Director Paul Dennison, and his team woke on Sunday morning to watch gale force winds destroy two marquees which had been vital on the previous day. A marquee used for the medical and first aid staff was blown 200 vards across the event field and the race control marquee was flattened.

## THE CAKE RACE Lancashire BM/16km/518m 05.05.12

A record turnout of 153 runners turned out to the Pennine Village of Diggle for a most traditional fell race. The race itself is actually a cover for a keenly competitive cake competition. In recent years the standards have reached new heights, with some truly inspirational designs. The best bit is that the competitors eat the lot after they have raced.

The race itself, known for years as the Autumn Leaves until we moved it from October to May, is not in the strictest sense a fell race. We set it up as a trail race originally as it is wholly on paths and tracks around the Wessenden Valley and Boat Lane that leads from Diggle over to Marsden. At 10 miles and 1700', the quick boys are round in just over the hour, but it has a bit of everything and judging by the number of regulars who return each year it must be enjoyable.

A cold but bright morning greeted the runners, and a random kit check reminded competitors that this is a serious sport and should not be taken lightly. West End Runners from Leicester once again came in their hoards with over 20 getting round, though they did suffer two nasty falls requiring medical attention (thankfully, both now fully recovered)

Jason Williams returned to defend his title from last year, and although not quite as quick, still headed home the field in some style. Colin Bishop (1st V40) came home second with Paul Green in third, both being previous winners. Sale Harriers put out a strong line-up taking the team prize.

In the ladies' race, Sam Fox (1st V40) brought some of her road success to the fells with a strong performance coming home over two minutes ahead of former winner Laura Davison. Third lady was Becki Penrose. Saddleworth ladies managed to just hold off West End for the team prize.

## PENDLE CLOUGHS FELL RACE Lancashire

## AL/22.5km/1250m 05.05.12

This fifth running of the race brought a good field of 80 runners to the beautiful and unique village of Downham. Dry, sunny but cool conditions prevailed with the going underfoot on the hill firm to slightly soft, ideal conditions for running, and with quite a few good runners and past winners lined up, the record looked set to be broken.

We weren't disappointed, with Tom Brunt winner in 2009 and Andy Brown, last year's winner, doing battle throughout, Andy with his local knowledge sometimes getting the better lines.

At CP3, Tom had nearly a minute lead but by CP6 Andy had regained half a minute. Heading down Ogden towards Boar Clough, Andy took an early line to CP7, Tom carrying on the path losing height and having to back track to reach the CP, but by the final CP at the Lane Head road

crossing Tom's lead was still around half a minute.

A strong run down the fields to the finish saw Andy bring the gap down to 19 seconds, finishing in 2.04.39, 56 seconds quicker than his winning time last year, Tom completing the course in a new record time of 2.04.20, 12.16 inside his 2009 winning time, and picking up the coveted pewter tankard.

They had both obviously enjoyed their battle, listening to them after, discussing the different and better lines to take. Tom is convinced that with better local knowledge, the two hour barrier could be broken. "Any takers?!"

There were also good runs from Shaun Chew and Mike Wallis and Pete Booth to name a few.

The first Lady was Carol Life. The Life family had another good day with both Alan and Carol taking the V40 prize. Unfortunately, for the second time, I messed up when copying down the results, missing Alan out when presenting the prizes, although one happy runner was the unexpected recipient of a bottle of wine. Sorry Alan, not the way to treat someone who has supported and competed in every race, and always attains a top ten finish. Fortunately, I had a spare bottle which I managed to give to you after.

Besides that, the day went smoothly, although an access problem at Churn Clough due to diseased larch trees, and resulting in the forest being felled, caused limited route choice between CP5 and CP6 with most runners opting to take the higher line.

Subject to permission, next year I am thinking of re-routing the race over the fields towards Worsaw Hill entering the lane at Worsaw End, missing out the tarmac section of lane at the start. It is no longer in distance or height gain and no bottlenecks and when I have run that way, it's taken the same time so would not, I feel, alter the overall times. Any feedback on this would be appreciated.

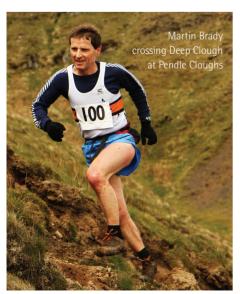
Lastly, I would like to thank all the volunteers and marshals for their help, all the runners for supporting the race and the Asherton Estate, without whose co-operation the race would not take place.

## GREAT HAMELDON Lancashire BS/9.6km/338m 06.05.12

This was the 31st race since its inception in 1979. The event was the first in the Pendle & Burnley Grand Prix, a series of 15 races taking place around East Lancashire between May and August. Despite a less than good weather forecast, it was a very pleasant sunny day for the largest field of competitors since 1998 with 205 senior runners on the starting line. In the junior races there were 44 in the various age groups under 16 years of age, the best turnout since 2003.

Brendan Taylor took the honours in the senior event in 38.14, just over two minutes slower than the record set by Rob Hope in 2004. Taylor was followed by Stephen Chew in 39.34 and Christian Holmes 40.09. Andy Stubbs Harriers was first veteran over 40 years of age in 40.51. Local runner Keiran Horrigan was first over 50 years in 42.17.

In the ladies, Amy Green was first to finish in 24th place overall in a time of 44.14, just 33 seconds outside the record she set in 2007. The second place was taken by Laura Hesketh in 48.24, closely followed by 17 year old Helena Leathley, ten seconds later. Molly Ralphson took the veterans class. Kaye Callaghan took the over 40s' prize and Irene Roche the over 50s.

In the Over 60 class, Tony Hesketh won in 48.41 whilst Karin Goss took the ladies' prize in 66.05. John Minton was first over 70 years in 63.38 and Dawn Lock was first lady over 65 years in 82.07.

Clayton's Samuel Hardisty was first man in the under 18s.

In the Under 8s' race 12 runners took part and ran an 800 metre route around the school field, led home by 7-year old Jack Smith. Christopher

Brown was the first 6-year old to finish. In the girls, Ella Dorrington-Levy was first 7-year old and Alanya Irvine first 6-year old.

In the Under 10s, 8 youngsters had a go at the 1600 meter course, with Eric Beaumont first home and also first 8-year old, whilst Ciaran Crabtree was first 9-year old.

The Under 16s, 14s, and 12s all did a route around the Coppice of around 2 miles. Twenty-four youngsters lined up. First home was 12-year old James Lund. Wharfedale took the next two places with 11-year old Thomas Nelson and 11-year old Logan Hargreaves-Madhas. Natalya Irvine, aged 11 years, was the first girl home. Fourteen year old George Pier took his age group, closely followed by Kelsey Rutherford, who was first 13-year old girl. Sophie Murphy was first 12-year old girl and Eleanor Root first 10-year old girl.

The weather had been dreadful in the weeks before the event but a clear, dry day provided near-perfect conditions for the 200 runners that started the 27th annual Jack Bloor fell race on Ilkley Moor.

Tom Adams won the senior race with an impressive two and a half minute lead and a time of 39.03. Next came the two Pudsey & Bramley runners of Fred Slemeck and Ian Nixon separated by only two seconds. Fred retained his Under-23 title winning the Arthur Dolphin Trophy for a second year. Current record holder, Greg Hull, came 4th winning the Over 40 veteran class whilst Steve Webb was 1st veteran in the Over 50 class.

This race commemorates Jack Bloor, an accomplished outdoor sportsman who did so much to encourage young people to engage in sport. All monies raised help support individuals under 25 to develop technical skills in outdoor pursuits.

Jack would have been impressed to see Lucy Crookes win the women's senior race at her first attempt and only having just turned nineteen. With a time of 48.06, Lucy was placed 42nd overall. Second place went to Holly Williams and 3rd to Lucy Needham. The veteran trophies for Over 40 and Over 50 went to Carol Evans and Alison Bennett redspectively.

The coveted senior race trophies were presented by Terry Lonergan of Complete Runner, a loyal sponsor and supporter of the Jack Bloor Race and Fund.

Jack's widow, Pat Bloor, passed away last August. To commemorate her long standing support for these races, Otley artist, sculptor and runner, Shane Green, created the Pat Bloor Trophy for the new ladies Under 23 class. Inspired by the Swastika Stone, this fine sculpture was presented to winner, Lucy Crookes, by Jack's eldest son and daughter, Robert and Hilary. Lucy said, 'My highlights were the fast descents and running along the tops with great views. The whole event has a friendly atmosphere and I can't wait for next year!'

In the men's' team competition, Pudsey & Bramley won, followed by Bingley then Ilkley Harriers. Welcome competition amidst the women's teams saw Otley AC squeeze Ilkley Harriers into 2nd place.

Throughout the rest of the field individual runners battled with personal rivals or simply enjoyed the challenge and atmosphere of the race. All were rewarded with a bottle of Jack Bloor Ale thanks to the generous support of the Ilkley Brewery Company.

After his win, Tom Adams said, 'The Jack Bloor Race has to be one of my favourite races of the year - and with the money raised going to a fantastic cause'.

The junior Jack Bloor Races saw yet another record entry of 132 runners reflecting the fantastic efforts to develop junior running in local clubs and schools. Children tackled courses of half a mile, one mile or 1.5 miles in one of five age-based classes (U8, U10, U12, U14, U16). Some were simply there to enjoy the

## CALDERDALE WAY RELAY West Yorkshire 6 legs/80.5km/3660m 13.05.12

Thousands of mud spattered legs, bum bags and coloured running club vests descended upon the Calderdale area for one of the biggest events in the fell running calendar, The Calderdale Way Relay, organised annually by Halifax Harriers.

Eighty teams from the fell running heartlands of the north, as well as an unlikely team from Milton Keynes, lined up below Clay House in West Vale to race the first leg of the six which cover the 50 mile circular route. Each team comprises twelve runners, who compete over the six legs in pairs. The inevitable mixture of

abilities amongst 950 plus competitors results in a lengthy chain of brightly coloured vests, snaking its way around Calderdale's boundaries before finishing at Heath RUFC's clubhouse on the banks of the Calder.

Organising such a huge event, managing the health and safety of competitors whilst trying to minimise disruption to locals and motorists along the route, is an enormous undertaking which depends upon the goodwill of a small army of volunteer helpers to register runners, marshal checkpoints and to make sure that everyone gets a drink and a sandwich at the finish.

For the runners, the race is a test of speed, endurance and the ability to navigate around a course which is not always marked as obviously as you might expect. It's especially easy to make a costly wrong turn at speed, which is exactly what happened to the winning team from Wharfedale Harriers. Lying second to Preston Harriers at the first change over in Crag Vale, they soon took the lead and, thanks to a lightning quick 3rd leg from junior star James Hall who, with Jonny Bradshaw, who took the baton in Todmorden and climbed the steep ascent to Blackshaw Head in just under 37 minutes, they had a six minute lead. British Championship contender, Ted Mason, took over with partner Sam Watson keeping a comfortable margin of four minutes over Leeds City at Wainstalls. Unfortunately, Jack Smith and James Craig lost their way en route to Shelf and lost the lead too, with Leeds City's Chris Needham and Chris Wright taking the baton for the final leg with a two and a half minute lead. Wharfedale hit back though. Stephen Chew and Gareth Hird ran a storming last leg to West Vale, finishing in 6.18.49, ten minutes clear of their

Leeds City rivals.

Holmfirth were the first ladies to finish in 7:34:40, the first Veterans team were Clayton Harriers Vets 7.01.42.

Not everyone got around unscathed but the injured were in good hands as the Calder Valley Mountain Rescue Team was on hand. They also had a team entered who came home a very creditable 66th in a little over 9.17.00.

Todmorden Harriers finished 4th in 6:36:01 and Calder Valley Fell Runners were the first mixed team to home in 6:59:11. Halifax Harriers entered four teams, very few of whom would call themselves fell runners, with the Vets team faring best in 22nd place (7:18:38), with three mixed or open teams managing 26th (7:28:23), 41st (8:03:10) and 72nd (10:04:46).

Halifax Harriers' major achievement though was in the organisation and marshalling of an event which brought a good deal of pleasure to many athletes from far and wide, many of whom were being introduced to the splendour of Calderdale's beautiful and wild landscape for the first time. The fell running forums speak of appreciation of a fantastic race day experience which promises to be even bigger next year.

The rest of the five man group finished strongly, all within 44 seconds of the winner.

A special mention must go to Jeffrey Pickup who won the vet 60 category but was placed well up the field in an excellent time.

Little did Richard Pattinson know that whilst he was running the marathon event for the first time his half record was been well and truly removed. The 45-year-old is probably in the form of his life and this showed as he set off at a similar pace to the half marathon runners. 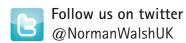
